DOUBT CAST ON DEATH OF VILLA

Pershing is Not Relaxing His Efforts to Locate Leader's Bandits.

Columbus, N. M., April 12.—While Lieut. H. A. Dargue and E. S. Correll, the aviators who brought reports to the border of Villa's death, pointed out that the natives in the American field of operations in southern Chihuahua believe the rumors and that every effort is being made by the expeditionary leaders to confirm them, close followers of Mexican politics here are inclined to doubt them. It was said that Villa, known as the "fox of the Sierras," is one of the craftiest of the Mexican leaders and that time without number in previous campaigns he has had himself reported wounded that the enemy might be misinformed. There is a strong possibility, a possibility recognized by military authorities here, that Villa is not wounded, despite persistent reports to the contrary, and is attempting to mislead his pursuers.

This contention is supported by the assertion of the air scouts that they had been told that Villa, in his flight made on a Junker biplane, carried on the shoulders of chosen followers, has refused medical assistance and sent for bandages which he bound to his body himself.

That Gen. J. J. Pershing, expeditionary commander, who has removed his headquarters to Santa Fe, is still pursuing his hunt, making every effort with his advanced detachments of troops to close in on the main body which the leader himself has been reported to be leading.

The cavalrymen in the field have found sabers, useless encumbrances in the type of warfare being waged against Villa, and as a result the troops are sending these weapons to the base. Eleven hundred sabers arrived from the 11th cavalry yesterday. Military men here point out that the discovery made by the troops in the field is important since heretofore much attention has been paid to the saber drills in cavalry stations.

SAYS VILLA DIED ON A RANCH. A Mexican business man from Chihuahua, who arrived in Juarez on Monday, stated that the report of Villa's death had been current in Chihuahua on Saturday, and that it was generally credited. The death of the bandit was said to have occurred on the Tarasco ranch, between Guerrero and Taboate.

Shot by Father of Girl Victim. Word was conveyed to Chihuahua of the shooting of Villa and his death by a Mexican from Guerrero. That informant said that Villa had been shot by the father of a young woman near Guerrero, in revenge for his daughter, and that the bullet felled in Villa's right knee. The father, the story goes, was taken out into the street by Villa's men and shot down.

ARMY GETS THE MOTOR DRIVERS

Sixty Leave El Paso in Six Days to Drive Trucks in Mexico for Army.

If it should be hard to get a jitne, or difficult to get a delivery of merchandise, or if the chauffeur does not show up after breakfast in time to take the man of business to his work, it is all explained by the fact that U. S. army has bid more for the chauffeur and the mechanic, and they have gone to the front. Tuesday afternoon 30 El Paso motor drivers and mechanics left on the Golden State limited for Columbus, where they will become drivers of the trucks now in service or of the ambulances and dispatch cars. Wednesday a second lot of 30 El Paso drivers and mechanics will leave for the front to take charge of another military truck train, that will go into the gasoline schedule from Columbus to Gen. Pershing's headquarters in Mexico.

FIGHT REPORTED WEST OF JIMINEZ

Train Runs Into Engagement; American Troops and Villistas, Maybe.

A mixed freight train from Jiminez to Parral, Tuesday at noon ran into an engagement between what seemed to be American troops and Villistas at Troya, a village some 15 miles west of Jiminez. The engineer reversed his engine and backed to Parral, where he made a report of what had happened and a representative of a Parral mining concern wired the information to his headquarters in El Paso. The message was very brief and simply stated that the engineer had seen from afar a number of men firing at each other along the railroad track, and realizing that it was a battle—big or small he could not say—the dejected the safer program would be to get back to Jiminez.

There was nothing in the telegram to confirm that the engagement was between the Americans and Villistas, save that the American troops are in that locality; nor did the telegram state that many men were involved or that any men were killed. A rule of the movements of men with guns had been seen; they were shooting at each other; more the engineer did not know. The message reached El Paso late Tuesday evening. The missing people said that since the telegram there had been no further facts.

COL. RIOJAS DENIES HE WILL EXECUTE AMERICAN AT OJINAGA

Presidio, Tex., April 12.—Col. Riojas, Carranza commander of the garrison at Ojinaga, just across the Rio Grande, today denied that Jose Rodriguez, an American citizen, held in connection with the recent murder of the mayor of Ojinaga, was to be executed. He said Rodriguez had not yet been given a trial.

Col. Riojas today issued his denial after he had received a request from the collector of customs that he delay execution of Rodriguez for investigation.

TREVINO WOULD HAVE MILITARY COLLEGES IN ALL MEXICAN CITIES

Mex., April 12.—Gen. Trevino, Carranza commander here, is advocating founding military colleges in all the large centers of Mexico, compulsory military drills in the elementary schools and the training of a minimum of 100,000 men yearly.

He says that by the execution of this plan Mexico would have in 10 years time 1,000,000 trained soldiers and that the morale and physique of the nation would be vastly improved.

Torreon, Mexico, April 12.—An airplane passed over Santa Rosalia today bound in the direction of Parral, where American troops have been reported to be operating. CARRANCISTAS THINK VILLA ALIVE; MAY SURROUND HIM

Mexico City, Mex., April 12.—Francisco Villa has left the main body of his command and is hiding, almost unattended, in the Sierra mountains of Chihuahua, according to information given out at the war department. Four thousand five hundred reinforcements have been ordered to the scene by war minister Obregon. These troops, including cavalry and infantry, will close in on four sides in

the region where Villa is said to be hiding. The war department express great hopes of the early capture of the bandit chief.
