Washington, D. C., April 24.—The Texas statute of 1907, imposing a tax of \$5000 per year on each place handling liquor, cash on delivery, was held invalid today by the supreme court as an interference with interstate commerce.

'SPOT' POSSIBLE NAVAL AUXILIARIES IN COAST PORTS

Vallejo, Calif., April 24.—Orders were received at the Mare Island navy yard today, directing an inspection and survey of all privately owned vessels in this district that might be available as auxiliaries in time of war.

MUST GIVE INFORMATION OF LIVESTOCK INJURIES

Washington, D. C., April 24.—The supreme court today decided that shippers of stock injured in transit, who sue bills of lading requiring notice of such injury at the journey's end, may inform a connecting carrier of the injury instead of the originating railroad.
