

GEN. OBREGON IS CENTER OF PLOT

Attempt to Dynamite Private Car of Mexican War Minister Discovered.

It is reported in El Paso and Juarez that an attempt was made to blow up the private car of Gen. Alvaro Obregon on Thursday night and that the plot was discovered in time to prevent the act being performed.

The car is well guarded during the daylight hours by a cordon of soldiers and at night the guard is augmented. Whether the attempt was made by the dynamite by wading in the waters of the canal, which would have brought him bearded with the car and undetected, or whether he was caught on the right between several parallel strips of box cars could not be learned, but that a plot was discovered and several arrests were made, is said to have been the case.

Gen. Gabriel Gaviira has been a visitor to the train a number of times since Thursday night, and not always to see Gen. Obregon. The matter of running down the conspiracy, rests with him and he is said to be doing everything possible to get at the bottom of the plot.

Friday morning Gen. Obregon was pictured by the movie men. He objected to the moving pictures, but said he would permit some still pictures. He seemed to regard the moving devices with suspicion, nor was he comfortable while their lenses played upon him and his family.

Andrew Garcia, the Mexican consul in El Paso, said Saturday morning that the report of a conspiracy to blow up the car of Gen. Alvaro Obregon in Juarez was so far as he knew, without foundation. "I heard of such a rumor," he said, "but so far as I could find it was an imaginary occurrence."

GEN. PERSHING'S REPORT ON HIS CAPTURE OF BANDITS

Fight lasted two hours, men being pursued as individuals into difficult mountain. Five Carranzistas condemned to death were taken and released.

"We have no casualties. Howse left here at 8:30 last night, marched 26 miles and reached Ojo Azules at daylight. Consider this a brilliant piece of work. Other cavalry detachments of this command are now operating in the several districts."

SIX CARRANZA PRISONERS RESCUED BY U. S. TROOPS

Gen. Frederick Funston received a message from Gen. J. J. Pershing Saturday morning by radio telling of the battle between Maj. Howse's cavalry and the Villistas at Ojo Azules.

This message stated that six Carranzistas who were being held for execution by the Villistas had been released when the attack started and that they were now in the American lines.

In addition to the 43 Villistas killed, a large number of wounded were left on the field and these had not been counted. The American troops captured 25 horses and mules and considerable equipment, Gen. Pershing's message stated.

Gen. Hugh L. Scott and Gen. Funston were both pleased at the report of the engagement and especially with the fact that the American troops were cleaning up the country for the Carranza government, ridding the country of bandits and rescuing the Carranza prisoners to their own commands.

HOUSE MEMBER BREWS TURMOIL

Urges Violence for Disfranchised Porto Ricans and Storm Breaks.

Washington, D. C., May 5.—Representative London, the only Socialist member, threw the house into a turmoil today by remarks on the suffrage clause of the Porto Rican bill.

As reported by the official stenographer and understood by members, Mr. London declared working people who are disfranchised by the bill would "have the right to use violence and the right to kill governors."

"I demand that the member's words be taken down," shouted Mr. Austin, Republican, from Tennessee, "and I wish that I could make a motion to expel him from the house."

Upon Mr. Austin's objections, Mr. London withdrew his remarks. He protested he did not advocate violence and insisted that he had been misquoted. What he really said, he declared, was that "disfranchised men would be told that they had the right to use violence."
