Mail Delays Arouse U. S. To Protest Sibley's

CENSURES BRITISH ACTION

American Government Cannot Consent to Continuance Of Policy, Says Note.

BIG VOLUME OF BUSINESS LOST Requires More Than Three Months to Exchange Letters With Sweden Now.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 22.—The new note to Great Britain, making protest against interference with the American mails, was laid before President Wilson today and probably will be sent to London tomorrow.

The note is understood to protest particularly against the British practice of taking vessels into British ports and there examining and detaining mail going to and from the United States.

N. M. MILITIA GETS AIRPLANE

RAILROADS IN TEXAS ADD \$3,308,440 TO INCOMES

Austin, Tex., May 22.—Income from the operation of railroads in Texas increased from \$17,417,806 to \$21,122,246, a total of \$3,704,440, or 21.3 per cent, during a period of nine months ending March 31, 1916, as compared with the same period the previous year.

INSANITY TO BE WAITE'S DEFENCE

Alienists on Hand When Trial of Slayer of Father-in-law Peck Opens.

New York, May 22.—Four alienists headed the throng of witnesses gathered in the criminal branch of the supreme court today for the trial of Dr. Arthur Warren Waite, the young dentist, sportsman and man about town, who is charged with murder, first degree, in poisoning his father-in-law, John S. Peck, a wealthy manufacturer of Grand Rapids, Mich.

Since he has confessed the murder, the prosecution believes that the defence will rely upon a plea of insanity. To combat this testimony the state has engaged three medical experts and summoned 115 witnesses.

Waite occupied a seat between his attorneys, Walter H. Denel, and Joseph P. Crater. Mrs. Clara Louise Peck Waite, his wife, who, it was announced, would be a witness against him, was not in court.

A crowd gathered but few persons not connected with the case were admitted to the courtroom.

Mr. Denel interrogating testimony, had shown on whether consideration should be given to evidence calculated to show the defendant was "mentally" at the time he administered arsenic to his father-in-law.

TEN YEARS IS LYNCH SENTENCE

London, Eng., May 22.—Official confirmation was obtained today of the reports that a sentence of ten years in prison has been given in the case of Jeremiah C. Lynch, an American citizen, charged with having participated in the Irish rebellion.

NINE ARE KILLED AND 35 HURT BY TORNADO

Denham, Tex., May 22.—Nine were killed and 35 injured at Kemp City, Okla., and the town was wiped out Saturday night by a tornado which swept a wide path through the Kemp City section.

NEW ROCK ISLAND PLAN MAY AVOID FORECLOSURE

Chicago, Ill., May 22.—Completion of a plan of reorganization which would make possible the early release of the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific from the receivership under which it is operated is contained in a brief filed today in the United States district court at Milwaukee by solicitors for debenture bondholders.

NAVY GUNNERS MAKE 47 HITS ON 67 SHOTS, 1800 YARDS.

San Diego, Calif., May 22.—Portuguese hits out of 67 shots at a range of 1800 yards was the record made by the ten inch gun pointers of the cruiser Pittsburgh at elementary practice in torpedo defense on the drill range off this harbor last week, it was announced today.

NAKED PATIENT LEAVES IN NIGHT

Mexican Escapes From the County Hospital, Robbed in Sheet and Blanket.

Ill of typhus, an unknown Mexican, who had been brought to El Paso from Conchos, Texas, Sunday, made his escape from the isolation camp at the county hospital early Monday morning, dressed only in a sheet and a blanket.

The discovery of his escape was not made until about 5 o'clock Monday morning and up to this afternoon he had not been found, although the city and county police officers had been advised and a search instituted.

Stek Man Cele "Viva Villa." The patient was last seen late Sunday night, when he received attendance from a nurse. At the time he was frequently calling out, "Viva Villa."

The Mexican had been brought from hotel Elca, after his case had been diagnosed as typhus and his clothing was burned, but Supt. J. S. McDaniel said he had not secured the man's name or data on his case.

Only Two Typhus Cases Known. This case and one that was discovered in the 1200 block on Santa Fe street Saturday afternoon by the city health authorities, constitute the only two cases of typhus that have been found recently.

COCA COLA CASE IS SENT BACK FOR TRIAL

Washington, D. C., May 22.—The supreme court today reversed the Tennessee federal court's order which refused to continue, on petition of the government, 40 barrels of Coca Cola seized by the federal pure food law and sent the case back for presentation to a jury to determine whether caffeine contained in Coca Cola is injurious to health.

HOUSE VOTES SUFFRAGE FOR WOMEN OF PORTO RICO

Washington, D. C., May 22.—By a vote of 99 to 27, the house in the committee of the whole today adopted an amendment to grant suffrage to the women of Porto Rico. It was proposed by Republican leader Mann.

RUSSIAN-GERMAN BATTLE IN BALTIC IS REPORTED

London, Eng., May 22.—Reports from Kalmar in Sweden on the Baltic, forwarded from Copenhagen to the Exchange Telegraph company, state that a violent cannonade was heard Sunday night and that it is believed a sea battle is in progress between German and Russian warships.

HOLLAND HOLDS GERMANY TO BLAME FOR TORPEDOING

London, Eng., May 22.—The Dutch government has decided to send a strong note to Berlin, fixing Germany responsible for the torpedoing of the Dutch steamer Tabantia, says a dispatch to the Daily Mail from Rotterdam.

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Col. Sibley Brings Prisoners To Boquillas; Wounded Left In Mexico.

By ASSOCIATED PRESS. ALATHON, Texas, May 22.—The American punitive expedition commanded by Col. F. W. Sibley, 14th cavalry, which entered Cuahuila in pursuit of the Glen Springs and Boquillas raiders, has now completely withdrawn to American soil.

Col. Sibley brought with him to this side four Mexican prisoners which were captured by Lieut. Crozier in a running fight near San Anita, Cuahuila, ten days ago.

Two Wounded Left Behind. There were two other prisoners, captured at the time, but they had been so badly wounded in the fight that they were left at El Pino by Maj. Langhorne. It is believed they will die.

According to arrivals from Boquillas today, there is no truth in the report that the Mexicans had been massacred by Yaqui Indians.

The report emanated from a message sent by the war department to Col. Sibley several days ago advising him that a band of Yaqui Indians had left Cuatro Chingas for Boquillas on the Mexican side.

Langhorne to Fort Bliss. It is believed here that since Maj. Langhorne is back on American soil with two Eighth cavalry troops he will be ordered to report with his command to Fort Bliss, leaving the work of patrolling the Boquillas and San Vicente border points to the Sixth cavalry which arrived this morning.

Col. Sibley will likely move his headquarters to Marathon but will distribute his troops throughout the Boquillas district to work in conjunction with the Sixth cavalry command of two troops.

Two troops of the Sixth cavalry were today on their way from Marathon to the border to take up the patrol work.

Troopers Are Fined Again. Two troopers, while swimming in the Rio Grande Friday near Demeter's ford, were fined at five times from the Mexican side. The soldiers, neither wounded, scolding for their ride to the border, but the puffs of smoke which had marked the Mexicans' place of concealment had drifted away.

MEXICANS WHO ATTACKED AMERICANS ARE DEPORTED

Pedro Suenz and Victoriano Ramos, self confessed leaders of a mob of Mexicans who attacked a detachment of the 12th cavalry at Parral, Chih., on Wednesday, April 12, were taken to the Santa Fe street bridge and deported Saturday afternoon by military authorities, cooperating with the local police department. Suenz and Ramos both stated to officers that they preferred to go back to Mexico rather than serve out a sentence for trespass in the city jail. Both were well supplied with funds, the amount of \$720 being found in their pockets.

It is said Suenz and Ramos were arrested by the Carranza authorities when they reached the Mexican side.

AUSTRILIANS TAKE 3000 ITALIANS

Berlin, Germany, May 22.—Austro-Hungarian troops have carried the peak of Armentara ridge, the scene of some of the heaviest fighting in the recently inaugurated offensive along the southern Tyrol front.

More than 3000 Italians were captured on Saturday by the Austrians who also obtained possession of several machine guns and 25 cannon.

AUSTRIA IS TO ABANDON ALBANIA, SAYS ONE REPORT

Paris, France, May 22.—A neutral diplomat who has just returned from Albania, is quoted in a dispatch to the Berlin from Athens as saying that the Austrians have withdrawn 40,000 troops from Albania in the last three weeks.

THE STATEMENT THAT THE AUSTRILIANS ARE WITHDRAWING THEIR MAIN FORCES FROM ALBANIA APPARENTLY CONFLICTS WITH REPORTS FROM ATHENS AND PARIS WHICH STATED THAT THE TEUTONS WERE ABOUT TO LAUNCH AN ATTACK IN FORCE AGAINST ATHENS.

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DR. BARBOUR IS ELECTED NORTHERN BAPTIST HEAD
