CARVE MOUNTAIN AS A MEMORIAL

Atlanta, Ga., May 20.—The work of presenting to the south a memorial of the war between the states, probably unique in design and scope formally was begun at Stone Mountain, near here today.

The mountain is a solid block of stone and on one of its most precipitous peaks will be carved figures nearly 40 feet in height of the south's heroes and scenes depicting the greatest civil war. At the base of the mountain will be carved an assembly hall.

Some years ago the United Daughters of the Confederacy conceived the idea of such a monument and enlisted the aid of S. E. Venable, who owns the mountain. It will require eight years to complete the work.

Leonard, of El Paso, accompanied by an army captain, will come here to inspect the animals. Local stockmen say that five carloads may be secured in this vicinity.

The general specifications for the horses wanted are that they must be geldings, three to eight years old, not less than 15 hands high, dark in color, either broken or unbroken.

CONFERENCE TO AD THE NORMAL

Cooperation of Arizona and New Mexico Sought for Ysleta Normal.

A conference of the state superintendents of education in Texas, New Mexico and Arizona is being arranged to be held shortly in an effort to agree upon some plan whereby the laws of New Mexico and Arizona may be changed, to give recognition to the Ysleta normal.

This is in line with the efforts now being made to make the Ysleta summer normal a permanent institution. Under present conditions only partial recognition can be given by New Mexico and Arizona, and it is hoped to secure a closer relationship.

Alvan N. White To Be Speaker. Miss Myra Winkler, county superintendent of schools, and promoter of the summer school at Ysleta, is in receipt of a letter from Alvan N. White, New Mexico state superintendent, advising that he will deliver an address during the normal. Several other prominent speakers are expected to address the teachers at some time during the term.

The prospects are very bright for a large attendance. Miss Winkler set as the minimum an attendance of 40. She says that the most of 25 teachers who will attend, while the Ysleta local committee has a number. Many El Paso teachers are expected to attend, and it is probable that the attendance will reach fully 100. Teachers will be in attendance from New Mexico, Texas and Oklahoma, and several Arizona teachers have signified their desire to take the work. One of the latest to be enrolled is Miss Edna King, of Wynnewood, Okla., who will be the guest of Mrs. E. A. Walters, in Val Verde, during the normal.

The normal will open on June 1 and will continue six weeks. Ample provision has been made for the rooming and boarding of the teachers in Ysleta during the term.

Phoenix, Ariz., May 22.—In an open letter to the hunters of Arizona, state game warden C. M. Willard asks that they refrain from shooting doves and whitewings at least till August 1.

In Arizona the open season for doves and whitewings opens June 1 and closes February 1. Last year warden Willard and his deputies kept close watch and found that these birds do their nesting and brooding between May 1 and September 1. The state game law is characterized by the warden as "over liberal in this respect."

Warden Willard said that while nesting or brooding birds are wholly unfit for the table.
