H. MARGUM, special counsel for the city in the prosecution of social clubs, made a report to the council Thursday on the prosecution of the suits.


"I am in favor of closing all the so-called social clubs and think this council should pass a resolution permitting Mr. Margum to bring suit against these clubs in the name of some private individual," said Mayor Tom Lea.

Alf Herman H. Stevens, disappointed of the council, stating that he did not think the charter gives the council the right to take the steps suggested.

There are two clubs operating in the city which I cannot prosecute in the name of the state, namely, the West Texas Athletic club, run by Sam Brown, and the International Social club, owned by Tom Powers.

SECRETARYSHIP GOES TO DODGE

Printers Also Elect G. A. Hoffman President; Referendum Method Used.

S. W. Dodge, of the Herald composing room, and one of the oldest members of the local branch of the Typographical union, defeated Roi Tolleson, of the Labor Advocate, for the position of secretary treasurer in the annual election of officers of the union, held Thursday evening.

The results of the election of local officers are: For president, G. A. Hoffman, 41, no opposition; for vice president, F. W. Timmore 42, no opposition; for secretary treasurer, Roi Tolleson 22, S. W. Dodge 45; for recording secretary, E. V. Smith 25, no opposition; delegates to Central Labor union, F. J. Schilling 62, F. Dimon 58, C. E. Wardell 52; for auditing committee, W. E. McCowan 61, C. F. McKay 62, G. McLean 63; for sergeant at arms, W. T. Bobbit 65.

On the 10th of April, I filed suit against the Cactus club, but the court refused to grant a preliminary injunction, for the reason that a similar cause had been tried and certain issues relative to it, had been adjudicated by a jury.

FIRST SCHOOL OF MINES GRADUATES



THE first class to graduate from the Texas School of Mines is composed of Clyde Ney, Vere Leasure and Lloyd Nelson. Mr. Ney is from New Orleans, La., but he has been in the southwest for several years prior to entering the Texas School of Mines, and came here from the New Mexico School of Mines at Socorro, N. M. Mr. Nelson's home is in Santa Rita, N. M. He also came here from the School of Mines at Socorro. Mr. Leasure is from St. Louis. After studying for a time at the Kollo School of Mines in Missouri, he came to New Mexico and spent some time in mining work previous to entering the Texas School of Mines.

Meat sold within the city of El Paso must be inspected and passed either by the United States government or by the city inspector, according to an ordinance passed under the emergency clause at the regular meeting of the city council Thursday morning. This ordinance comes as a result of many complaints that meat that has not been inspected and declared good had been found in the city, meaning the health of citizens.

An ordinance was passed under the emergency clause making it unlawful for a person, firm or corporation to permit the accumulation or storing of ice, fruit, vegetables, etc., and one regulating the manufacture and sale of ice cream.

The paving of East Boulevard, from Cotton avenue to Piedras street, will cost \$52,062.53, according to the estimate of the city engineer. The amount \$25,567.54 is assessed against property owners, \$16,322.81 against steam railways, and \$10,172.18 against the city. The report was adopted and June 23 was fixed as the date of public hearing of property owners.

Paving Petitions Granted. Petitions for the paving of Texas street, from Alameda avenue to Piedras street; Davis street, from Improvement District No. 1, to West Overland; South Stanton street, from Sixth to Eighth streets; and Ange street from Missouri to High streets, were granted by resolution, and the city engineer was instructed to prepare estimates of the cost of the improvements.

Four Petitions Granted. The following petitions were granted: J. E. Buntell, for permit to erect two sheds at corner of Stanton and Third streets; J. C. Long, for sewer extension to block 31, Manhattan Heights; property owners for improvement of Biester street, between 24th and 25th streets to the city limits; El Paso Central Market

company, for permit to excavate under sidewalk for basement. Four Petitions Referred. The following petitions were received and referred: Council as a whole—H. D. Smith, for permit to establish drinking tank in San Jacinto plaza. Streets and grades—Elks Lodge No. 187, for permit to use Cleveland Square on June 14, for flag day exercises; residents for arc light at Sixth and Hills streets. Taxation and finance—Aurelia Roman, for refund on occupation license. Fifty Deaths During Week. The weekly report of the city health officer showed 59 deaths, of which 15 were Americans, 32 were Mexicans, and three were negroes. Births totaled 19 Americans and 27 Mexicans. There were remaining of contagious diseases, six cases of measles, five of scarlet fever, six of small pox, five of typhoid fever, four of diphtheria, seven of chicken pox, one of typhus fever and one of whooping cough. One hundred and fifty-five pounds of meat were condemned and 10 ounces abated. The report of the sanitary commissioner showed 252 loads of garbage and ashes hauled. Get Park For Flag Day. The U. S. Army Relief society at Ft. Bliss was granted permission to use Washington Park on June 14, for the flag day and "Preparedness day" celebrations.
