

HATE AROUSED BY LITERATURE

American Says Incendiary Publications Cause Anti-American Outbreaks.

That anti-American literature that is scattered broadcast in Mexico is responsible for much of the hard feeling toward the American population in that country, was the statement of W. B. Ballard, of the Mines De Mayo mines, San Pedro, Chih., who arrived in El Paso at 5 o'clock Friday morning.

Mr. Ballard stated that the San Pedro mines, 30 miles from Casas Grandes, had been shut down for the past three months. The shutdown followed the Villa raid on Columbus. He has been spending his time since then studying conditions in that section and will return there tomorrow.

"The anti-American feeling is quite strong around San Antonio and Cruces," he said. "There is much sniping on Americans in these vicinities and there is also some sniping around Namiquipa. The army truck drivers, who come into Casas Grandes, are about the only source of news from the outside world. They are subjected to sniping from snipers and keep close together, in groups of 25."

"Apparently the Mexicans are friendly in Casas Grandes, but they are changeable. It has not been decided yet whether or not the San Pedro mines will be reopened in the immediate future."

COMMITTEE OF 100 IS FORMED

American Refugees From Mexico to Send Appeal to Chicago Conventions.

"The Committee of 100" is the name of an El Paso organization of American refugees from Mexico which is being formed with the avowed purpose of publishing to the people of the United States the facts concerning the true situation in Mexico.

Production in Mexico. The committee asks, through a circular just issued over the signature of Gerald Rivers, treasurer, who is a mining man of this city with years of residence in Guanajuato and Chihuahua districts, for the moral and financial support of all American refugees here in a nonpolitical endeavor to properly present to the people, whom they say, have been kept in ignorance of the conditions in Mexico, an appeal for action that will guarantee to the American in Mexico protection and the opportunity to develop his holdings equally with other foreigners resident there.

Appeal to Chicago Convention. An immediate plan of the committee is to offer a strong appeal to the public convention in Chicago for protection for Americans at home and abroad and the nomination of a man for president who represents those principles.

MEXICAN UNIONS TO SEND MEN TO EL PASO CONFERENCE

Mexico City, Mex., June 3.—A delegation of four men is to be sent by Mexican labor unions to El Paso, Tex., to confer with representatives of the American Federation of Labor for the purpose of avoiding a war between Mexico and the United States.

Women members of the Mexican unions met today to prepare a petition to the women of the United States asking them to use their influence to prevent the hostilities between the two countries.

U. S. SAYS STAY OUT OF MEXICO

Acting Secretary of State Warns Mining Men Not to Go to Interior.

Advices from acting secretary of state Polk received in El Paso, warn American mining men and other Americans who contemplate going into the interior of Mexico that their actions would be "expedient and hazardous at this time." However, Americans have not been forbidden by the United States government to enter Mexico. They are only being urged to stay out.

Instructions were given Thursday night by collector Z. L. Cobb to the inspectors at the bridges to warn any American crossing to Mexico with baggage of the danger in the interior of Mexico. No Americans with baggage crossed during the night of Friday morning, however.

Quarters To Go Back. A. J. McQuatters is one of the local mining men whose confidence for the safety of Americans in the interior does not waver. He is connected with the Alvarado Mining and Milling company and has announced that two representatives of the company will leave soon for Parral, Chih., near where the mines are located.

W. R. Benedict, also a representative of the Alvarado company, arrived in the city yesterday en route to Parral, Chih. "Unless something unforeseen occurs, I shall continue on my trip," he said.

WASHINGTON SAYS NO SUCH ORDER WAS ISSUED

Washington, D. C., June 3.—Officials here were puzzled by the news that customs inspectors at El Paso had been instructed to prevent Americans from going into Mexico. The treasury, state and war departments, it was said, said no orders had gone from Washington.

CHIHUAHUA RIOT PROTEST NOT YET FILED BY LANSING

Washington, D. C., June 3.—The state department, it was decided whether a protest will be made to Gen. Carranza, on account of the anti-American demonstration in Chihuahua City, Wednesday night. An official report received at the department follows closely the story of the demonstration told in news dispatches.

VILLISTA BANDITS TAKEN TO CHIHUAHUA FROM JUAREZ

Eleven former Villista bandits were taken from the Juarez jail yesterday and sent to Chihuahua City, where they will be turned over to Gen. Jacinto Trevino, according to Gen. Gaviira. The bandits were arrested recently at Madera, Chih. It is alleged they took part in the Villa raid on Columbus. No information as to the prisoners' penalty has been given in Juarez.

TRUCKMAN SLAIN AT EL VALLE, MEX.

Mexican Slayer Is Released; Claims American Was Tried to Enter House.

Columbus, N. M., June 3.—The body of the American truckman killed by a Mexican at El Valle, Mex., several days ago has been identified as that of Theodore Bagley of New York city, according to dispatches here today from field headquarters.

After an investigation, military authorities released the Mexican who shot the truckman. It being asserted that the American was seeking to enter the Mexican's house at the time.

19 U. S. SOLDIERS KILLED AT PARRAL, SOLDIER SAYS

Nineteen United States soldiers were killed in the Parral riot and the bodies which were buried near Parral are to be dug up and brought to the United States, according to an American soldier who arrived here from Namiquipa Friday morning.

He stated that he had passed a motor truck train going south from Namiquipa on board. These coffins were to be used for enclosing the remains of the American soldiers who, he says, were killed during the riot which occurred between the people of Parral and the American troops in command of Maj. Frank Tompkins. The American troops first entered the town.

The soldier stated that the men were buried near Parral without coffin and a detachment of the hospital corps was being sent with the motor truck train to prepare the bodies for final burial in the United States.

MEXICANS STONE SOLDIER; MEXICANS AND SOLDIERS FIGHT

Pvt Harry F. Fleming, company F, seventh infantry, sustained a severe cut on the head late Thursday night when he was attacked by a number of Mexicans at Virginia, and second streets and struck several times with stones. Fleming, according to his statement to the emergency hospital, where the wound was dressed, when sent back to camp. Prior to the attack on Fleming a fight occurred at Tornillo and First streets, between a number of Mexicans and two soldiers. No one was injured.

CHIHUAHUA FOREIGN CLUB WRECKED BY RIOTERS, REPORT

R. Anderson, manager of the Foreign club at Chihuahua city, is anxiously waiting in El Paso for the arrival today of the assistant manager of the club, George Wood, who, it was said, was present in the scene of rioting which occurred Tuesday night. "I have received information that the Foreign club was wrecked by the rioters," said Mr. Anderson. "I learned that they took a huge rock and completely demolished by fine desk, littered the business papers over the floor and ransacked the liquor storeroom."
