

VALLEY BANKER FILES CHARGES

Cashier of Valley Bank at Anthony Sues for Possession of Children.

Alleging that his wife left their home at Anthony, N. M., with the minor children, with the intention of abandoning him, George W. Fowler, a banker of that place, Sunday sued out a writ of habeas corpus in the 24th district court to secure the custody of his minor children, George Gray Fowler, aged five years, and Lillian Marguerite Fowler, aged four years. The children were secured Sunday at 2623 East Missouri and placed in the hands of Mrs. Emma Webster, county probation officer, pending the hearing in the case.

In his petition, Fowler alleges that he is the husband of Latta Fowler, and that on June 2 his wife left Anthony, N. M., and came to El Paso with the two children, with the intention of abandoning him. He stated that he is cashier of the Valley Mercantile & Banking company at Anthony and is able to properly take care of the children.

By an agreement entered into by all persons involved in the suit, George Fowler, Jr., the boy, was given to the father, and Lillian Fowler, the daughter, to her mother, pending a further order of the court. This agreement was reached Monday afternoon.

DEATH DELAYS REEIGHT CASE

Injunction Hearing Is Postponed Because of George Sweeney's Death.

Hearing was postponed until Friday morning at 10 o'clock on the petition for an injunction to close the new "edlight" district which is now in full blast on the canal, below Eighth street. Judge R. E. Price, of the 1st district court, announced Monday morning that the postponement is on account of the death of George Sweeney, who was counsel for some of the defendants. Mr. Sweeney's death occurred Sunday night, but the funeral will not be held for several days, pending the arrival of relatives from a distance.

The petition for an injunction was filed by R. N. Rowington, who has a saloon at Eighth and Santa Fe streets. He sets up the claim that the nearness of this segregated district is hurting his business. The defendants named in the petition are: W. S. Hull, A. S. Brown, Maria Salazar, Victor Blet, Sr., Crisologo Croxson, Joe Goodman, Victor Blet, Jr., Bettino Tarin, Blanche Locke, R. T. Locke, Joseph Stenger, Oscar E. Kades.

J. L. Campbell, president of the Good Government club, was in the court room when the postponement was announced. One of the club's purposes is the permanent abolition of the restricted district and the suppression of prostitution.

H. BLOCH GOES TO TRIAL ON CHARGE OF RECEIVING COPPER

The case of Herman Bloch, charged with receiving and concealing stolen property, was called in the 14th district court Monday morning. A motion for a continuance was overruled and the selection of a jury was begun.

Bloch is charged with having received and concealed 2000 pounds of copper valued at \$150, the property of O. L. Snell. The alleged offense is said to have occurred on August 7, 1915.
