
Marihuana Smokers See Glass Mountains New Police Judge Says: "No Dimmers, Fine"

OF ALL the deadly narcotics I think Mexican marihuana is the most terrifying, said Dr. O. P. Dawson. Marihuana is a weed and is smoked something like opium.
