

THINKS POISON SPOTS REGENT

Chemist Believes They Would Not Have Retained Odor for Months After.

Waukegan, Ill., July 5.—William J. McNally, coroner's chemist of Cook county, became the center of interest today in the trial of Will H. Orpet, accused of the murder of Marian Lambert, because of important conclusions he is said to have reached respecting the cyanide of potassium spots discovered on the coat Marian wore at the time of her death.

It was said that state's attorney Dady faced the proposition of making a statement on the matter to the court and jury, or having the defense put the chemist on the stand. Counsel for Orpet said they would not place McNally on the stand unless the state made it necessary by its evidence.

It was believed today that the defense would close its case by tomorrow, and predictions were that the case would go to the jury by the end of this week or the first of next week. The jury, which spent three days at the home of juror Bartlett at Channel Lake, returned Tuesday night to their quarters in the Lake county court house.

Carrot Marmalade

By CONSTANCE CLARKE.

CARROTS contain a large amount of sugar, and, on account of their deep color, make a very attractive-looking preserve. Take two pounds of new carrots, three pints of water, three pounds of sugar, three ounces of root ginger, the juice of two lemons, and a pinch of cayenne. Scrub and scrape the carrots, and cut them lengthwise into layers. Leave them to steep in cold water for twelve hours, then change the water and allow them, to

steep again for the same length of time. The steeping is to draw out the strong flavor. Drain and dry well. Put the carrots, sugar, ginger, juice of lemons, cayenne and water into a preserving pan, and boil for a quarter of an hour. Then turn into a bowl and leave until the next day. Repeat this process (boiling for fifteen minutes) daily until the carrots are transparent, which usually takes about three or four boilings. The boiling should in each case be very gentle, merely simmering. Turn into jelly glasses and cover.

EIGHT DEATHS, 190 INJURIES, 13 FIRES, TOLL OF FOURTH

Chicago, Ill., July 5.—According to figures compiled at midnight by the Chicago Tribune, the toll of the Fourth of July was eight deaths and 190 injuries throughout the country. Last year there were 19 persons killed and 392 injured. Comparisons made over a period of 17 years since the "fourth" propaganda was started indicate that fatalities have been reduced almost to a minimum.

Fire losses this year were almost negligible. San Francisco had 13 fires.

Two persons were killed at Worcester, Mass., and one in each of the following cities: Jacksonville, Florida; Portland, Ore.; Scranton, Pa.; Toledo, Ohio; Waverly, Iowa; Wheeling, W. Va. The greatest number of accidents were reported from Cincinnati, where 25 persons were injured. Philadelphia came next, with 31 injured.

Chicago's toll was but four injured, none seriously. A city ordinance prohibited the sale of any explosives for use in Fourth of July celebrations here.
