

WELSH-WHITE BATTLE COMING

Ten Rounds Seems Short Distance to Decide Lightweight Title.

By T. S. ANDREWS. Milwaukee, Wis., July 12.—Freddie Welsh, the world's champion lightweight, and Charlie White, challenger for the title, are to get together once more in a ten round battle with no decision. They have agreed to meet at Minneapolis, some time during July.

Mr. Sherman first tried to match up White and Mitchell, but they could not agree on terms, so he switched to Welsh and the Chicago boy. If it is a success, it is likely that Mitchell will be matched with the winner for a Labor Day date in the event of the proposed Willard-Fulton match falling through.

Chris O. Brown, the New York sporting man and also theatrical luminary, is very much taken up with the work of Jimmie Reagan, the California lightweight, who went to New York recently in search of matches. Chris thinks that Reagan has the makings of a lightweight champion and he has taken such a fancy to the boy that he is willing to back him for a battle with Welsh or any 125 pounder living, for a battle over the marathon route.

Jimmie has battled such boys lately as Frankie Burns, Willie Ritchie, Joe Rivers, Bill Wagner, Harry Pierce, Johnny Lore and Joe Welling. His recent contest with Welling at Providence, R. I., was a 15-round battle, which was declared a draw.

"I may be wrong in my guess," writes Chris, "but if ever a lightweight looked good to me, it is Reagan. The boy seems to have everything and I am ready to back him for any amount."

Reagan has been matched to box Andy Cortez, a very tough lightweight, before the Brown Athletic club at Park Row, New York, on July 15. It is likely that he will get a chance in a 20-round battle at Tulsa, Okla., with either Charlie White or one of the star lightweights.

Nearby Fighter 62 Years Old. The "come back" staged by Walter Edgerton of Philadelphia, better known to the fight fans as the "Kentucky Sideshow," has been the cause of numerous discussions among fight fans as to the real age of the famous negro boxer. I was under the impression that Edgerton was about 48 years of age, for he was fighting at his best around 1888-9, when he met George Dixon several times in short bouts.

Edgerton writes me from Philadelphia, on my 44th birthday, and that was in 1888. During the fighting career of Bobby Burns, featherweight champion at that time, and my father, of Boston and Jimmy Jackson of England, who came over with quite a reputation, I met all of them in Philadelphia. I knocked out Johnson in 15 rounds. Since my retirement from the game I have met such men as Frank Hamon, Young Gelfo, Solly Smith and Joe Gane in short bouts and whipped most of them. I was then in my prime and about 35 years of age.

STAGE FISTIC BATTLE ON PEAK

Army Pugilistic Aspirants Relieve Monotony of Camp Life in Mexico.

Pershing's Headquarters in Mexico, July 12.—On the peak of a mountain which marks the resting place of a forgotten Aztec chief of many centuries ago, fistic gladiators of the army battled in a 20 foot ring last night for the honors of the punitive expedition. Six bouts were staged, four of four rounds each, one of six and a windup of ten would have stirred the cockles of any boxing fan. None ended in knockouts.

The color line was drawn to prevent the stirring up of race hatreds. "Nubian Horse" of the Tenth cavalry, was matched against "Senegambian Foot" of the 24th infantry, and white against white. A hand-to-hand and mistral program preceded the bouts. Five sets of gloves, which had been packed in kits by army fight fans and carried throughout every month of the expedition, were brought out for the occasion. Space was reserved for officers and newspaper men, each bringing his own empty ashtray can or box for a reserved seat. The only permanent seat was a 20 foot plank and two boxes for the staff, the cheering soldiers squatting. The ground receipts will be used in purchasing gloves, baseball bats and other athletic supplies.

RECORDS BROKEN IN KELLY'S SALE

Price for American Association Player Highest in Minor League History.

Chicago, Ill., July 12.—Outfielder Joe Kelly, purchased Wednesday from the Indianapolis club of the American association by president Weegman of the Chicago Nationals, is expected to report in Chicago today in time for participation in this afternoon's game with the Philadelphia team. This is said to be the first move by president Weegman to strengthen his team.

The amount paid for Kelly was not made public, but it was currently reported here this morning that \$15,000 was not far out of the way for the cash consideration, besides two club players. Who these two players were to be had not been divulged early today. Kelly was said to be one of the best outfielders in the American association.

His price is said to be the highest ever paid for a minor league ball player. Kelly is a right handed batter who hit .308 last year and led the American association in base stealing with 41 thefts. So far this season he is hitting about .200.


