

HUGHES SPEAKS TO DEMOCRATS

Criticises Administration and States His Policies, Despite Heckling

Nashville, Tenn., Sept. 5.—Charles E. Hughes, Republican nominee for the presidency, appeared Monday night before a Democratic audience in a territory in which a Republican candidate for the presidency has never before campaigned, and he got away with it.

quently with the opposition of employers to the principle of arbitration. Sometimes they have refused to arbitrate disputes. Public opinion has been against them. I stand hence firmly for the principle of arbitrating industrial disputes and I would not surrender it to anybody in the country.

Favors Reign of Reason. "I believe that anything that is right in this country can be settled right. What is our Republican government? What are our free institutions? We have come down the long course of history with the people fighting slowly, slowly—now with defeat and now with victory—for a recognition of the reign of reason instead of the reign of tyranny and force.

"Now then, I stand for two things: First, for the principle of fair, impartial, thorough, equal arbitration; and second, for legislation on facts according to the necessities of the case. And I am opposed to being dictated to, either in the executive department or congress, by any power on earth before the facts are known.

Audience Applauds Him. The audience, which had interrupted Mr. Hughes repeatedly in the earlier portions of his speech to cheer for Wilson, heard the nominee's declaration in silence and at its conclusion applauded him.

J. W. Taylor, Republican state chairman, the first speaker, was interrupted time after time by cheers for Wilson. And a burst of Wilson cheers set down and the second speaker, George N. Tillman, chairman of the meeting stood. Mr. Tillman was on his feet for 10 minutes much of the time vainly endeavoring to make himself heard. He introduced Mr. Hughes and the audience sat in silence.

Hughes Cheerful With His Audience. "I shall not forget the warmth of the welcome of this vociferous meeting," Mr. Hughes said, and the audience applauded. He added that what he had to say was to be said good naturedly at a time that the American people were taking stock.

"I do not desire in anything I say to express aught but the highest respect for those who do not agree with me," he continued. "I simply desire to say what I think, why I think it, why I am here and then let the American people judge according to their own consciences."

Applause for Hughes and Wilson. The audience applauded and Mr. Hughes outlined his views on American industry, the test it will face when the war ends and the doctrine of a protective tariff.

Just Reading Democratic Platform. "Believe our opponents do not believe in the doctrine of a protective tariff," he said, producing a memorandum from his pocket. He checked a Wilson cheer by adding:

"I am not going to say anything unpleasant, my friends. I am just going to read the Democratic platform."

"I believe," he continued, "in protecting American industry."

"There would not be much disposition to clap," said Mr. Hughes smiling as the applause died down. "In this country if that doctrine got headway, very long."

Good Natured Clash Over Huerta. The nominee then assailed the administration for its policy toward Mexico. He outlined its attitude toward Huerta, declaring that the question was not one of recognition or nonrecognition, but one of protecting American rights.

"You would have recognized that assassin, wouldn't you?" shouted a man from the audience.

"Now, I didn't say that," Mr. Hughes started to reply. The rest of his answer was lost in the tumult which followed.

"What would you have done?" shouted another man as the noise subsided.

Bring Audience to Feet. "I would have protected American rights," the nominee responded, pointing his finger at the questioner.

The audience rose to its feet and applauded loudly.
