

BIG CROWD AT NEW MEX. FAIR

G. A. R. Men Fire Salute With Cannon Used 75 Years Ago at Glorietta.

Albuquerque, N. M., Sept. 25.—Indications at the state fair headquarters here today, from rooms supplied to strangers in town, the number of exhibitors present, and tickets sold before noon, are that the crowd this year at the fair will be the largest recorded.

Open Gun Fired. R. E. Putney, president of the 1915 fair, delivered the opening address. The opening gun was fired by members of the G. A. R. who used one of the cannons with which the Confederates fought in the battle of Glorietta, 55 years ago.

Many Improvements Noted. People attending the state fair this year are greeted at the numerous entrances that have taken place upon the fair grounds.

The livestock sheds, which heretofore have extended from the main entrance to a point opposite the grandstand, and which have always been an eyesore to the grounds, have been removed to a position on the north end of the grounds.

Another addition to the convenience of the public is the extension of the street car tracks into the fair grounds.

The sheets occupied by the swine department have always been more or less crowded. The commissioners ordered the exhibit space in this department doubled.

H. D. CAMP, PLAINTIFF IN BIG CATTLE SUIT, DEFEATED

A jury in the 54th district court, before Judge Ballard Colwell, returned a verdict Monday against H. D. Camp and others in their suit against R. W. Gurley and Jackson & Harmon, of Alpine, Texas, involving about 10,000 head of cattle. Camp and his associates bought the cattle from the Alpine parties and charged that they later discovered the animals were tubercular and had been "doped" to disguise the symptoms.

Camp and his partners alleged that the cattle were sold to Gurley and Harmon, who then sold them to the Alpine parties, who in turn sold them to the defendant.

CHURCH SHOULD BE TREATED CORDIALLY, CHAPLAIN TELLS MINISTERS.

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Soldiers Ought To Be Treated Cordially, Chaplain Tells Ministers.

"Make the soldiers welcome in your churches and open your homes and you will find splendid types of manhood among them," sums up the exhortation made Monday noon to members of the El Paso Ministerial alliance by army chaplains and Y. M. C. A. workers at a joint meeting and luncheon in the First Presbyterian church of ministers, chaplains and "Y" men.

Thirty religious workers were present at the assembly as guests of the ministerial association and the women of the Presbyterian church, who followed and served the meal that preceded the addresses.

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CANAVEA HAS NO FEAR OF PANCHO

Hospital Head Former Captive of Villa, Says Bandit Scare is Over.

"Pancho Villa is the least of our worries in Cananea," said Dr. H. H. Thayer, head of the Cananea General Hospital, leader of the Cananea hospital at that city, who was at Hotel Sheldon Sunday, with his wife and child. Dr. Thayer is on his way to Chicago, where he will spend a month in clinical work at the Augustus and Cook county hospitals.

"I once was captured by Villa, but he has no terrors for me now, although he was formidable enough at that time. It was just after his attack on Agua Prieta when my friend, Dr. Miller and myself, accompanied by two chauffeurs, went to Agua Prieta to offer first aid. We were at once captured by Villa, who at that time was highly enraged against the 'gringos' because of president Wilson's recent recognition of Carranza.

Things are booming at Cananea. The four big smelters and the main line of that section are going full blast. Conditions never were more prosperous or peaceful. Everyone is making good money, high wages are being paid and the business men are profiting. The Cananea Consolidated Copper company alone has about 4000 men on its payroll.

Pancho Far Away. "Of course, Villa is nowhere near us and so far I have heard of no alarm connected with his recently renewed attacks. We are separated from his present field of operations by the continental divide, which finally were turned into a few difficult passes.

I felt so secure of the situation that I even contemplated leaving my family here, but the epidemic scare now is being checked. However, had I decided to go alone, I certainly would have been in Cananea, where we are as comfortable as we could be in any city in the states."
