ARRANGEMENTS were completed Saturday morning at 10 o'clock at a meeting of Mrs. J. A. Rawlings and her committee, for the floral show during the International Soil Products exposition in El Paso.

The floral show will open on October 14 with Cactus day and will run through the exposition with various dates for the special display of different flowers and plants. On these days there will be special music and lectures given by the different florists of the city. The booth for the floral department will be directly behind the Mexican village and will be decorated inside with pine shims and given a rustic effect. It will be further decorated with ferns in hanging baskets, birds in cages, etc., in addition to the display of flowers and plants to be made each day.

Floral effects will also be shown daily by the different florists. A reception committee will be in charge at all hours.
