RITCHIE AND MCCARTY TO FIGHT IN JUAREZ, NOT ON THIS SIDE

County Attorney Orders That Boxing on Texas Side of the River Must Cease in Compliance With Texas Laws—Promoters of Ritchie-McCarthy Fight Readily Agree to Go Over the River to Hold It.

JUAREZ will be the scene of the light-weight battle between Willie Ritchie and Johnny McCarthy, originally scheduled to be held at Rio Grande park on November 11, but which has been set back one day by matchmaker Fred Winsor and promoter Sam Rowan and will be held on Sunday afternoon, November 12, at 2 o'clock.

With the announcement of the contest, the lid which has been clamped on athletic events of all kinds in Juarez for the past year, has again been raised, and the little border city will again be again the Mecca of southern sports, and will enjoy the popularity of 1912-13 when it was one of the boxing centers of the country. At the same time "the lid" goes on all boxing contests in El Paso.

The change of the stage of the battle from Rio Grande park to Juarez followed a conference between county attorney C. W. Cronin and promoter Sam Rowan and matchmaker Winsor Wednesday afternoon. Prior to the conference, it was understood that boxing bouts could be staged under an athletic club charter, such as that held by promoter Rowan. In view of

the fact that the holding of boxing bouts in the state of Texas could not be permitted under the law, however, promoter Rowan, not wishing to conflict with the county attorney in any way, agreed to change the scene of the fight to the battle across "cutl" across the river, two Francisco Cortez has endorsed the action of promoter Rowan in selecting Juarez.

Fighters Arrive Immediately.
McCarthy is due to arrive here this afternoon and Willie Ritchie tomorrow afternoon. Both are said to be in fine condition and ready for the battle of their lives, when they meet in the Juarez arena. Expectations of a record crowd are being entertained by those handling the contest, in view of the large number of visitors in the city, who will doubtless be attracted by the class of the two principals, Ritchie and McCarthy, who are two of the highest rated lightweights in the country and can command a substantial purse at any time. Ritchie is in view of the fact that he has fought Freddie Welsh for the championship, which he lost some time ago.

State Law Is Specific.
The section of the Texas law prohibiting contests in the state, and which caused the bout to be changed to Juarez by promoter Rowan and matchmaker Winsor, reads as follows: "Any person who shall voluntarily engage in a pugilistic encounter between man and man, or a fight between man and a bull or any other animal for money or other thing of value, or for any championship or upon the result of which any money or anything of value is wagered, or to see which any admission fee is charged, either directly or indirectly, shall be deemed guilty of a felony, and, upon conviction, shall be punished by imprisonment in the penitentiary not less than two or for more than five years."

No More Bouts in El Paso.
It is understood that the decision of Mr. Cronin will prohibit all future boxing bouts in the army camps at El Paso.

FAVOR O'TOOLE IN TEXAS BOUT; BIG FOOTBALL GAME IS ARRANGED

Livingston Not Afraid of O'Toole's Wallops; Washington Football Team, With "All-America" Stars, to Play 31st Michigan on Sunday; Tex Rickard May Promote Heavyweight Bout; Are There 2 "Kid Wolves"?

WHILE it is a long way to Camp Stewart, a number of local fans made the trip on Wednesday afternoon to get a line on Tommy O'Toole, who is training hard for his bout at Camp Cotton next Tuesday night with Tommy Livingston. O'Toole is certainly showing up well. He demonstrated in his workouts on Wednesday that he is a real two-handed fighter and has already been installed as favorite over Livingston.

O'Toole's record is certainly better than that of Livingston for the Winkles. He has had a very good record in the bantam and featherweight divisions. While Livingston has also had some good men, they hardly rank up with the galaxy of names in the record of O'Toole.

Livingston Can Take Punch.
Livingston, on the other hand, has been boxing here for several months. He is a clean ringster and is always the best of condition. That Tommy is an all-around fighter and still comes out of a win was demonstrated at Tucuman, with Lubb. The Denver light-weight is expected to hit as hard as O'Toole so Livingston's friends have no fear of O'Toole and his wallops.

Kid Barend, Featherweight Champion of the Army, is one of the sparring partners in the camp of Tommy Livingston and also getting in his training for his own bout at Camp Stewart on the night of Nov. 15 with "Young" Dempsey, over the ten-round route.

There are apparently two "Kid Wolves" in the fight game. There is a youngster out at the Ohio camp who has been boosted here as the original "Kid Wolfe" and his manager came out with the assertion, several weeks ago, that his man was to be matched with Johnny Ertle, immediately on his return to Cleveland, O.

Tex Rickard is reported to be dickering for the services of "Battling" Levinsky or Jack Dillon for a bout with Jess Willard in New York some time this winter. The two men in question both make well under 175 pounds in condition.

Soft Snap for Willard.
The logical opponent for Willard would be the winner of a match between Carl Morris and Fred Falton. However, after the "bravery" shown here by the champion, his desire to meet a near middleweight can be well understood.

Victory of Light, Fast Pittsburg Team Over the Heavy Syracuse Team Was Revelation to Beholders; Panthers Blocked Plays and Tackled Runners With Dazzling Speed.

NEW YORK, Nov. 2.—Speed is the main essential in football success in this generation. Beef and brawn count for but little when the footman are fleet of foot and agile in movements.

This has been demonstrated on many occasions during the past two years, but never more forcibly than in that Pittsburg-Syracuse game which was won, 39 to 6, by Pitt. That contest, more than all the others that have gone before, forced the realization of the impotency of beef when it is pitted against speed and trickery.

Panthers Speed Amazing.
