

CAN'T CARRY A FLASK IN ARIZONA

Man May Own Liquor But Dare Not Move It or Carry It About.

Tucson, Ariz., Jan. 14.—New and interesting situations have developed in connection with the transportation feature of the new prohibition law. It is lawful to possess liquor, though it must be liquor that was brought into Arizona before the middle of last December. But it may be unlawful to take the liquor with one, if there be a change of home location. Distinctly it is unlawful to carry a flask of liquor on a journey or even out on the street.

NORTH TEXAS AFTER SPEEDERS.

North Texas has started a campaign against speeding in an effort to cut down the numerous accidents that have resulted recently on county highways. The campaign is also on in Dallas county pikes. Sheriff Reynolds has employed two motorcycle deputies, who are chasing the speeders. They made 12 arrests last week. The fine for speeding, with the costs, averages about \$25. The speed limit is 18 miles per hour. It may be raised by the next legislature, as a movement is on foot now for a new law.

Funeral of Dead Boer Cavalryman at Las Cruces Attended by Many Friends.

Las Cruces, N. M., Jan. 14.—The funeral of Gen. Benjamin Johansen Viljoen, former cavalry commander of the Boers in the war of the transvaal, and once prominent adviser to president Madero of Mexico, who died at his home at La Mesa Sunday morning after a lingering illness, was held in the Methodist church at Las Cruces at 2:30 Monday afternoon and attended by many residents of Las Cruces and the Mesilla valley. The funeral service was conducted by Rev. H. P. Bond, pastor of the Highland Park church, El Paso, formerly pastor of La Mesa church; Rev. Duncan Matheson, of the Mesilla Park Presbyterian church, and Rev. T. L. Lallance, pastor of the local Methodist church.

Cover the coffin of the dead Boer general was draped the Boer flag. The floral tributes were many and beautiful.

Gen. Viljoen was a member of a family of ten children, having three brothers and six sisters. His aged mother, wife, brother and other relatives were present at the funeral. Gen. Viljoen came to this country shortly after the close of the Boer war and settled in the vicinity of La Mesa.

Gen. Viljoen was the author of a history of the Boer war, written while he was confined as a prisoner on the island of St. Helena, and later he wrote a historical novel on the war.

Gen. Viljoen was born in Africa September 7, 1848, and was therefore 68 years of age. For the past five years he suffered from asthma but died of pneumonia.

Gen. Viljoen was a member of a historical society, and he held the office of steward and trustee.

His father was a Huguenot, who fled from France. Gen. Viljoen's schooling in early youth consisted of only about seven months, his military life beginning when he was a mere boy. He was a member of the legislature of the Transvaal at one time.

Private W. E. Viljoen, with the sixteenth corps in the Pershing expedition in Mexico, is a surviving son. The honorary pall bearers at the funeral were J. A. Smith, J. P. Williams, Sol L. Beran, Scott White, H. El Paso, and H. R. Holt and ex-mayor R. L. Young, of Las Cruces.

During the first battle of Juarez, Viljoen was in charge of the local artillery. Later he was sent by Madero as a peace commissioner to the United States in connection with a treaty time applied for Mexican citizenship papers, but never became a Mexican citizen, he afterward claimed.

During the past 18 months he was in California supervising the making of a Boer war picture, of which he was the author. He was also connected with the Otis-Chandler ranch interests in Lower California.

Perry J. Rice officiating. The body will be shipped to Springfield, Mo., for interment later.
