

VIRGINIA SUES WEST VIRGINIA

Petitions Supreme Court To Compel Legislature To Provide Payment.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 29.—Mandamus proceedings were begun today in the supreme court by Virginia authorities against West Virginia's entire legislative assembly to compel levying of a tax to pay the supreme court judgment of \$12,333,000, with interest, adjudged to the West Virginia proportion of the Virginia state debt in 1861 when West Virginia was formed.

Papers in the extraordinary proceeding, without precedent in American jurisprudence, were received by the court, but no action was taken today. A ruling is expected Monday, and if Virginia is given leave to file the mandamus suit, West Virginia probably will be given time to show cause why a writ should not be issued. Reopening of the case may result, as West Virginia has offset claims it desires to present.

TIRE COMPANIES ARE INVESTING

Goodyear, Firestone, Fisk Factories To Have Wholesale Depots Soon.

Plans are being drawn by H. M. Beutell for a large warehouse building to be erected on East Texas street by Lee H. Orndorff and to be occupied by the factory branch of the Goodyear Tire & Rubber company. The plans have not yet reached a stage where details of the building can be given, but it is stated that the new building will be one of the most modern warehouse buildings in El Paso.

Manager T. J. Fitzgerald, of the Goodyear branch, states that the new building will be utilized entirely for wholesale purposes and that all the retail business will be handled by the factory service depots of the company scattered throughout the city.

Firestone to Erect \$50,000 Building. Another tire company is to enter El Paso with a factory branch. E. J. Firestone, vice president of the Firestone Tire & Rubber company, assisted by S. W. Carlisle, treasurer of the company, and H. A. Grubb, manager of the Texas division, have closed a deal for a site 120 by 120 feet at the corner of West Santa Antonio and Durango streets, where a two story and basement fireproof building will be erected immediately by the Firestone company. The building will cost in excess of \$50,000.

Fisk Building Ready in 2 Weeks. The building for the factory branch of the Fisk Rubber company on Mesa avenue, between Montana street and Boulevard, is progressing rapidly and will be ready for occupancy by the Fisk company in about three weeks. It is one story with basement, 60 by 120 feet.

THE KRESS STORE ADDITION COMPLETED; OPENING THURSDAY

Workmen have completed the addition to the Kress store and the goods are now being arranged for the formal opening next Thursday afternoon and evening. Between the hours of 2 and 5 in the afternoon and from 7:30 to 9 at night the public will be admitted for an inspection of the new store and an orchestra will play. Friday morning all the three selling floors will be opened for business. Two elevators have been installed, one at the front and another at the back. For several months the work of adding two additional stories to the store has been in progress. The basement and top story will be used for stock space. The first, second and third floors will be sales floors.


