We felt as we came into Bisbee that we were among home folks and in the manner in which we have been received proves this."

True Southwestern Welcome. Robert Krakauer declared that the Bisbee welcome had the true southwestern spirit and that of the visit of the El Pasoans was one of appreciation. "The business parties must have confidence in each other," he said. "We want to know you and we want you to know us. Come to see us as we come to see you. Let's keep up this acquaintance."

Bisbee People Can't Help It. M. Neuman said he did not believe the Bisbee people deserved the praise they had received at the hands of the El Pasoans for their cordiality. "For they just can't help it, they were born that way," he asserted. "If Bisbee could capitalize its silver tongue and its golden heart," he continued, "the results of the banks would be surprising with treasure. No man could live in this atmosphere, associate with the people and be anything but progressive and hospitable. It is an extraordinary thing for a hundred business men to make such an excursion as this, covering a distance of 200 miles. 'Dep, Push and Progress' are qualities necessary in the struggle for existence and to the end that men have happy homes and a great nation. We are exemplifying what we have found in Bisbee."

The proposition was accepted by the San Francisco chief of police and Bonella was sent westward alone.
