The witness said he often held checks for large sums through the request of bank officials and not through the request of Mr. Watson. TESTIFIES FOR FORMER WIFE

Moore Tells of Events Leading Up to Killing of Wife's Second Husband.

Denver, Colo., March 24.—Attorney Wm. A. Moore, divorced husband of Mrs. Stella Newton Moore Smith, was called to the stand in West side court today to testify in behalf of his former wife, on trial for the murder of her husband last January.

Moore's testimony was confined to events preceding the murder of Smith and he was on the stand when the noon adjournment was taken.

Mildred Moore, daughter of the defendant, who was present in the Smith home just prior to the shooting and who was taken from the house by Moore early on the morning of the tragedy, will be called to the stand this afternoon, it was said. The defense expected to complete its side of the case today and the state's rebuttal was expected to begin Monday.

Tale of Smith's Threats. Tales of threats made by Smith against his wife and against her daughter, Mildred, were told on the witness stand yesterday by Mrs. Katharine Straube, of Colorado Springs, Mrs. Straube is the mother of Smith's first wife.

The threats, she said, were made in her house in Colorado Springs December 21, she said. "He told me that unless Mrs. Smith signed papers to give him \$10,000 he meant to do her double and for her and for members of her family. He declared he would ruin her 12 year old daughter and said if he would not do it he would get someone who could. And he said also he would kill William A. Moore, her former husband.


