

**GOOD ROAD POOL
ON AUTO TOUR**

**Will Attend Two Road
Convention and Work for
Auto Roads Into El Paso.**

Judge Adrian Pool and wife left El Paso Tuesday night for Grand canyon, by automobile. They will make the trip by way of Tucson and Phoenix and, returning, will visit Albuquerque and Santa Fe.

On June 14, they will leave their car wherever they happen to be and will go by train to Midland, Tex., where Judge Pool is to represent El Paso at the convention of the Fort Worth-El Paso Highway. They will then go to Amarillo, where the judge is to represent El Paso at the Ozark Trails convention. Judge Pool announces the appointment of W. O. Rose and G. A. Martin as the other two El Paso delegates to the Ozark Trails meeting. After the Amarillo meeting, Judge and Mrs. Pool will complete their vacation.

Boosting the Highway.
Judge and Mrs. Pool have just returned from a trip to Fort Worth and the judge says the counties all along the line between El Paso and Fort Worth are working hard for the new road. The road is completed across half of Reeves county, he says, and Toyah has voted bonds to complete the road across the western part of the county to a connection with Culbertson county, which is now preparing to vote bonds to do its share of the work. Taylor county has just voted to issue bonds for its part of the work.

"Everybody between Pecos and Fort Worth will attend the meeting at Midland on the 14th," said Judge Pool. "There will be an automobile parade with 3000 automobiles in line on the opening day of the convention."

Ozark Trails Road.
"I have advised from Alamo to the Ozark Trails road in our fight to bring the Ozark Trails road to El Paso. The Ozark Trails road is going to pass their road bond issue and \$1,000,000 of this money is going for work on the road between Orogrande and Newman. When this work is done we will have a good short line along the railroad from El Paso to Alamo. An appropriation is also provided for to improve the road between Orogrande and Alamo, but this is already fair. The creation of this road as a state highway will give it state aid and will be a large factor in inducing the Ozark Trails people to select it for their outlet to the Pacific."

A Branch Here Anyhow.
"If we can't bring the Ozark Trails road through here, I am sure we can induce the convention to designate a branch from Amarillo down through Clovis, Roswell and Alamo, to El Paso. The main road as now outlined goes from Amarillo to Las Vegas and then down to Albuquerque and west by way of Gallup, Holbrook and Williams. As this route is closed by snow during the winter months, I am sure we can induce the promoters to bring a branch down to El Paso to connect with the Borden road route here, as it is open all the year."
