

CHAS. BURDINE IS FOUND DEAD

Carpenter Dies in Room on West Overland; Officers Seek Relatives.

The dead body of Charles Burdine, about 48 years of age, a carpenter, was found in the rooming house conducted by Samuel Geck, 307 West Overland street, Saturday morning at 3 o'clock, by Mamie Geck, daughter of the proprietor, when she went to the room to see why Burdine had not gone to work.

Mr. Burdine had lived in El Paso about five years, but his relatives are unknown it was said. He had roomed at 307 West Overland for about a year.

Coroner James M. Deaver was called and rendered a verdict that death had resulted from heart failure. The body was taken to the Kaster undertaking house, where it is being held while a search for relatives or friends is conducted. Police sergeant Tom York attended the inquest.

JONES INDICTED BY DALLAS JURY

Man Held in Lyons Case Is Charged With Murder of Girl in 1913.

Dallas, Tex., June 20.—Felix R. Jones, who is being held without bond in the El Paso county jail on a charge of murder following the discovery of the body of Thomas Lyons, of Silver City, in a ravine in Highland Park on May 18, has been indicted by a Dallas county grand jury charged with the murder of Florence Brown in Dallas, in June of 1913.

The Dallas county grand jury returned an indictment against him Saturday morning. Information received in El Paso gave no intimation of the evidence on which the indictment was found. The murder of Florence Brown had been a mystery since her body was found in Dallas. She was a stenographer and was killed in a Dallas real estate office.

When Felix R. Jones was seen in his cell at the county jail by a Herald reporter Saturday he denied having committed the murder of Florence Brown, at Dallas. The accused man said he had never seen the girl and the only thing he knew about the crime was what he read in the newspapers at the time her body was found.

Jones was lying on his cot, attired in his underclothes when the reporter accompanied by Detective E. J. Zehner, interviewed him. The prisoner was very ill Friday night and was holding his head.

"Do you know Florence Brown, who was murdered in Dallas in 1913," Jones was asked.

HELEN KNOWING GIRL

"No, I never knew her. I don't think I ever saw the girl in my whole life if I did. I did not recognize her, for she was a stranger to me."

"You have been indicted for her murder," Jones was told.

The man jumped from his cot to a sitting position, and seemed very nervous. He then again reclined on the cot.

HAD HEAD OF CRIME

When he was asked what he knew of the crime, Jones said: "The only thing I know about the death of this girl is what I read in the papers. I believe she was killed two or three years ago, either by being poisoned or shot. I don't know which."

"I have forgotten the circumstances surrounding her death, which I read at the time. I know her body was found and that she had been killed. I don't think any one was ever arrested for her murder. Aside from this, I know absolutely nothing about her death."

Jones then refused to make any further statement regarding the death of the girl.

Jones is confined in the same cell occupied by Victoriano Huerta, former provisional president of Mexico, when he was arrested here.

Chicago, Ill., June 20.—Girls from Iowa entertained 225 sailor boys from the Great Lakes naval training station and 26 candidates for commissions at Fort Sheridan, at a picnic in Jackson park here today. The guests are boys from Iowa who are in training for national service and the hosts are Iowa girls resident in Chicago.

AUTO LICENSE BOOKS CLOSED

County Clerk's Records Open Ten Years; Must Apply at Austin Now.

Saturday was the last day owners of automobiles could register at the office of the county clerk and receive licenses under the old Texas law, Monday morning the licensing of motor cars and vehicles of all descriptions will be done under the jurisdiction of the Texas highway commission. No agent for the commission has been named in El Paso, it was said Saturday.

The books of registry have been open in the county clerk's office nearly ten years, the license numbers running consecutively. Of nearly 10,000 motor vehicles there are probably 2,000 out of service.

Dr. Frank Thatcher, 3323 Trowbridge street, secured the first automobile license in El Paso county. It was issued August 1, 1907, by clerk Park Pittman and numbered 1. The license was for an Oldsmobile runabout. License No. 2 was issued the same day for a Buick. License No. 3 was for an Oldsmobile runabout. Billy Davis had license No. 4 for an Oldsmobile runabout. License No. 4, which was for a two seater Reo.

LAST LICENSE IN 1922

The last license issued on Saturday was No. 10,322 and was issued by clerk William D. Great to the National Exchange and Commission company, 222 South El Paso street. The license was for a Ford.

While the state law provides a penalty for failure to make application for licenses by July 1, it is unlikely that there will be a very strict enforcement of the provision, due to the fact that the clerical force in the state highway department at Austin is swamped by the thousands of applications pouring in. It is doubtful if many of the El Paso motorists will be able to get their license plates before July 15.

MUST APPLY DIRECT

There is no provision in the state highway law for payment of officers to accept the registrations and it is likely that application will have to be made in future direct to the state highway department, the applications being handled by a small fee to be paid by the applicant. Should this be done, it will eliminate trouble for motorists.

ABOUT 4000 DELINQUENT

It is estimated that at least 4000 El Paso cars are "delinquent" in that the state fees have not yet been paid. The Herald will continue to supply blanks for making the statements but will not forward further fees.

The road for applications on Friday was heavy, but the rush on Saturday morning at The Herald indicated that some new records would be set during the day for the number of applications filed.

Kingdon Gault To Wed Italian Girl, An Artist

New York, June 20.—Kingdon Gault, eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. George J. Gault, obtained a license here today to marry Signorina Annarosa Camilla Maria Lancia, daughter of Conditto and Fortunata Menci Luceri. She is an artist. He said the marriage will take place Monday at St. Patrick's cathedral.

Mr. Gault is 29 years old. His mother was Edith Kingdon. He has been interested in his father's many business enterprises since he left Columbia university, where he studied engineering in the school of mines. In 1908 he went to Cripple Creek, Colo., to work in the mines.

ARREST MANY, BUT HAVEN'T FOUND BENSON'S SLAYER

Many arrests have been made and many men released in connection with the murder of Sidney J. Benson, the policeman who was killed Thursday morning while taking a Mexican to the station, who had been arrested at the Southwestern shops by the watchman, Ed Aten.

Mr. Aten went to the police station where he inspected the rugged gallery in the detectives' office in the hope that he might recognize one of the men who have been in the custody of the police before.

"We are exhausting every effort to find a trace of the man who killed Officer Benson," said chief E. J. Zehner, Saturday morning. "The \$5000 reward will be paid out of the pockets of El Paso's policemen if we can find the man."

Stanley Good, secretary to the chief, worked Friday night on a list of Garicias known to the police, as the name given to the watchmen at the shops was Jose Garcia.

FOUR KILLED, TEN INJURED, IN BLAST IN COLORADO

Trinidad, Colo., June 20.—Four men, including superintendent J. B. Jeannette, were killed and ten injured, as the result of an explosion, which wrecked two buildings of the E. I. du Pont de Nemours powder company at Augusta, near Aguilar, in this county, late yesterday. William Wilson, one of those injured, probably will die. The cause of the explosion has not been determined.

Officials at the plant declined to make any statement concerning the affair. The crash shattered windows half a mile away. The plant comprises six buildings, all widely scattered.
