

CARDINALS APPOINT PRIEST TO LOOK AFTER ARMY CAMP AFFAIRS

Rev. Lewis J. O'Hern To Represent the Church in All Work Among Enlisted Men in 16 Training Camps; Congregationalists To Hold Council in October; Federal Council Urges No Vacations.

REV. LEWIS J. O'HERN has been appointed by the Roman Catholic archbishops, headed by the three cardinals, Gibbons, Parley and O'Connell, to represent them in all work of the Catholic church for enlisted men. The appointment carries with it the designation of the Catholic church's proportion of government chaplains in the regular service, and such additional chaplains as the government recognizes for work with hospital units. Father O'Hern has already taken in direction of spiritual work directed by the Catholic church and to be done at the 16 training camps in seven or eight days.


HOROSCOPE



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SCRIPTURE
