

BUILDING A MILITARY CAMP CITY



ABOVE photographs (by Paul Richards, Herald staff photographer) show the activity in Deming attendant upon the construction of buildings to accommodate a division of 35,000 national guardsmen. The top picture shows a bunch of workmen being brought in from the camp to town for the noonday meal. The army trucks bring these men in twice a day—for lunch and for the evening meal. Second picture from the top shows the temporary establishments that have sprung up to supply cold drinks to the workmen and the troops when they come. The third picture from the top shows a view down "Army avenue" in the camp. This avenue will be several miles long and the different commands will be strung out in a line as they were in Camp Stewart at El Paso last year. The next picture below shows a street in Deming, with new, temporary buildings being erected to care for the merchants who are flocking in. On the left at the bottom is one of the recently opened eating places—the appropriately named "Verdun restaurant," where the hungry hordes make desperate charges three times a day. On the right at the bottom is a picture of Maj. Chas. H. Miller, construction engineer, in charge of building the camp.
