# FRENCH CABINET UPSET; SOCIALISTS DO NOT BELIEVE TO BE PREVENTED

### Socialists, Dissatisfied With Conduct of War by Ribot Ministry, Decline to Give Their Support Unless Radical Changes Made; Painleve to Throw Ginger Into War Operations.

PARIS, France, Sept. 10.—The action of the Socialist party yesterday in refusing to collaborate with Alexandre Ribot in forming a new cabinet, which caused M. Ribot, after consultations, to notify president Poincaré that he was obliged to give up the effort, was quite unexpected.

An explanation of the Socialist step was given by some of their deputies who declared that when premier Ribot announced that a reconstruction of the cabinet would take place, the Socialists were under the impression that fundamental changes would be made and it was not that understanding that they agreed to continue to collaborate with the government.

**Want a More Vigorous War.**

They found out, however, that a majority of the existing ministers would be retained, that in the case, they considered the ministry did not offer sufficient guarantees of the more vigorous conduct of the war or of a truly democratic policy, the deputies explained, and consequently the party decided to withhold its support.

**Proposed Three Changes.**

In effect, it appears, the principal changes contemplated by M. Ribot would be the substitution of Briereux for Martin, as minister of justice; of Maurice Long for the much-criticized Maurice Villetelle as minister of education; and the creation of a new ministry of national reconstruction to which Louis Lucien Klotz, president of the chamber's budget committee, was to have been nominated.

**Painleve Supports Socialists.**

On the withdrawal of the Socialists, M. Ribot proposed to make Louis Loucheur, who, as under-secretary for munitions in charge of the manufacturing section, had rendered excellent service in organizing the industries, minister of munitions in place of Albert Thomas. When the new ministers assembled last night, however, Prof. Paul Painleve, minister of the interior, who would continue to continue in office without Socialist representation in the cabinet. This brought about the collapse of the cabinet.

**Painleve To Be Premier.**

It is expected president Poincaré will appoint M. Painleve to form a cabinet and there is a strong probability he will succeed. Prof. Painleve, as minister of war, has made an excellent record on political circles on the general public and in the army. Notable among measures he took was the appointment of a cabinet of command-in-chief of the French army and the revival of the post of chief of the general staff for Gen. Foch. The minister's success has been well received generally.

# NEW REVOLT IN RUSSIA; KORNILOFF IS "TRAITOR" ARMY IS FOR DICTATOR?

RETROGRAD, Russia, Sept. 10.—Members of the cabinet today informed the Associated Press that the provisional government regards the pronouncement of commander-in-chief Gen. Korniloff, in which he has demanded unlimited power to organize a government at his convenience, as an act of rebellion which must be suppressed ruthlessly.

The government believes it has enough loyal troops and the support of the Russian people to enable it to put down the Korniloff movement.

**Conservative Back Korniloff.**

When M. Lvoff saw premier Kerensky on Saturday and presented Gen. Korniloff's demands, it developed today, he held the premier, that an organization of duma members, Moscow industrial interests and other conservatives who played the role of opposition at the Petrograd conference, was supporting Gen. Korniloff.

**Another "Traitor" Arises.**

At Petrograd, another "traitor" has arisen. Gen. Lokomsky also proved a traitor, refusing to take command of the Russian army in succession to Gen. Korniloff.

**Kerensky Invited to Headquarters.**

Gen. Korniloff, according to Gen. Korniloff, said M. Lvoff, were not against Kerensky, who was invited to general headquarters to meet Gen. Korniloff. The premier refused the demands of M. Lvoff, who was then arrested and under examination gave the details of the conspiracy.

**Cabinet Resolves Agreement.**

The cabinet of the provisional government, in conversation with the Associated Press, refused to be quoted by name. They stated the ministers had reached an agreement regarding the following points of view:

The government regards Gen. Korniloff's pronouncement as an act of rebellion, as a dangerous adventure and a threat to the revolution and liberty which, unless the ultimatum is withdrawn, must be ruthlessly suppressed.

**Expects to Crush Rebellion.**

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following proclamation: "On September 8, a member of the duma, M. Lvoff, arrived in Petrograd and called upon me in the name of Gen. Korniloff, to head all civil and military power to the generalissimo, who would form a new government at his pleasure. The authenticity of this manifesto was afterwards confirmed by Gen. Korniloff himself, who had a conversation with me on the direct telegraph wire between Petrograd and main headquarters.

**Revolution.**

"Considering this summons addressed through me to the provisional government, I am obliged to accept the quarters to profit by the difficult situation of the country and establish a new government, which will be the result of the revolution, the provisional government has recognized the necessity of changing me, for the safety of the republic, to take the urgent, indispensable measures necessary to put an end to the anarchy and to restore the rights of the citizens won by the revolution.

**Korniloff Is Removed.**

"I, therefore, for the maintenance in the country of liberty and public order, am taking all measures which I shall announce at the proper moment to the people. At the same time, I order Gen. Korniloff to hand over his command to the provisional government." (Continued on Page 2, Col. 4.)

# GRANDS GLAMOR GUARDS AT TACK

### AT TACK OF OFFICER OF BRITISH "DREAM OF PASSION" CASE, INVOLVING HOMICIDE, AROUSES PUBLIC. OFFICER SHOTS A BOGUS COUNT

OXFORD, Eng., Sept. 10.—Crowds of curious women and others clamored for admittance to the trial of Lieut. Douglas Malcolm for the murder of Anton Bamberg, a pseudo count, opened. The case, which has been characterized as "a dream of passion," is the first here in which the "unwritten law" is expected to be the sole defense, and is the most sensational in London in many years.

A coroner's jury returned a verdict of "justifiable homicide" after hearing Lieut. Malcolm's plea that he killed Bamberg in "defense of his wife's honor."

Thousands of applications were made for tickets to the court room, but it was decided not to issue any. The police closed the doors as soon as the court room was filled. A confession by Malcolm's wife, who is called a great beauty, that she became attached to Bamberg, who is expected to play an important part in the trial, which probably will be concluded next week.

Lieut. Malcolm returned from the front, discovered the alleged relations between Bamberg and Mrs. Malcolm, and promptly shot and killed Bamberg.

# FRENCH AGAIN FREED FROM GERMAN LINES

### HELINGFORN, Finland, Sept. 10.—The Finnish senate has drafted a bill for the definite separation of Finland from Russia. The bill will be presented to the provisional government, who the message declares, in the form of an ultimatum.

### 150 BELGIANS ESCAPE AND TAKE GERMAN GUARDS ALONG

PARIS, France, Sept. 10.—According to a telegram from Havre, where the Belgian government is temporarily located, about 150 Belgians have succeeded in crossing the frontier into Holland and freedom in a curious manner.

### 23 AMERICAN AMBULANCE MEN ARE DECORATED

# HOHENZOLLERN MUST GO? Germans Become Furious In Denouncing America

### AMSTERDAM, Holland, Sept. 10.—There was a fresh outbreak of rage against the United States in Saturday's newspapers in connection with secretary of state Lansing's reported denial of the statement that America would not insist on the elimination of the Hohenzollerns before entering into peace negotiations.

### Measure Is Placed on Final Passage After Long and Heated Discussion

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 10.—After five weeks of debate the senate today in the last stage of the war revenue bill. All debate was shut off at 2 o'clock this afternoon under the unanimous consent agreement, when the bill was put upon its final passage.

Before the final vote was reached, however, several features were disposed of, embracing consumption taxes on sugar, tea and coffee, the three per cent freight transportation; the second class mail rate increase; proposed repeal of the income tax; and the provision for income corporations' undivided profits to be paid in cash.

The 1917 debate began on the consumption tax on sugar, tea, coffee and cocoa and their substitutes. Senator Wheeler moved for its elimination and senator Borah urged retention of all of the consumption taxes.

English taxes were cited by the Utah senator as much greater than proposed by the committee.

# SUBMARINE CAMPAIGN IS PARTLY A HELP TO ENGLAND

### LONDON, Eng., Sept. 10.—Baron Rhododa, food controller, in an interview with the correspondent of the Amsterdam Handelsblad, declares that the submarine campaign is partly a help to England.

### GERMANS ADMIT DEFEAT IN MACEDONIAN BATTLE

BERLIN, Germany, Sept. 10.—German newspapers reported that the German army had retreated before superior French pressure, says the official statement issued from Germany. Of these, only the Teutons retired in the direction of the heights southwest of Lake Ochrida.

### GERMANS AND AUSTRIAN QUEEN OF BELGIUM FLIES OVER THE GERMAN LINES

PARIS, France, Sept. 10.—Queen Elizabeth, recently made an airplane trip over a section of Belgian territory under German control. With King Albert, she was visiting the front in Flanders held by the French troops and during her stay went to an aviation center where for some time she watched the expert aviators perform various feats.

### GERMAN CONSULS AND SOLDIERS IN MEXICO CITY

MEXICO CITY, Mexico, Sept. 10.—A number of German consuls recently have arrived in Mexico City, including Herr Schulte, of Juarez, and Herr Kuehnrich, of Tampico. Their visit, taken in conjunction with the arrival of German military men, who had been for some months in Sonora and on the west coast, has led to the suggestion that a conference of German officials has been called here.

### GERMAN PAPERS TO BE EXCLUDED FROM MAIL

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 10.—Exclusion of German language newspapers printed in various sections of the United States is under consideration by the post-office department as part of the government's determination to prevent circulation of anti-war propaganda.

# LEAGUE REVOLVED, GERMANY IS SOON TO OFFER PEACE TERMS

### HIGH BRITISH OFFICIALS SAY OFFER IS COMING BEFORE WINTER, GERMANY PUTTING FORTH PROPOSITION OF RESTORING STATUS QUO; WASHINGTON HEARS GERMANY WILL RESTORE OCCUPIED TERRITORIES, SELL ENGLAND COLONIES.

LONDON, Eng., Sept. 10.—Throughout official London the belief is held that a very definite peace offer will come from Germany before winter and that the offer will suggest immediate cessation of hostilities on a status quo basis.

### NOVA SCOTIA SCHOONER DESTROYS A SUBMARINE

PARSONS, N. S., Sept. 10.—News has been received here of the destruction by a Nova Scotia schooner of the Nova Scotia schooner Minasqueen, the loss of all but one of her crew.

### WANTS MARKETS AND FOOD.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 10.—What purported to be an outline of Germany's peace terms has been circulated among diplomats here within the last two weeks, but has been regarded by the entire embassy and state department as a "feeler."

### THE WAR AT A GLANCE

THEIR great battle which Gen. Cadorna is waging for the Italian front, the Austrians are being subjected to unrelenting pressure, but by means of heavy concentrations of fresh troops they have been able to keep the Italians from achieving the notable success which completion of the capture of the mountain would constitute. The Italians have captured 45 guns from the Austrians since the beginning of this offensive.

### PICKING IN MACEDONIA.

THE Macedonian fighting is again assuming importance. On the extreme west front, the French have apparently massed a considerable force. Yesterday they reported capturing several villages in the Mallek lake region.

### RUSSIA AGAIN HAS CRITICAL POLITICAL SITUATION TO FACE, HOWEVER.

Gen. Korniloff, deposed from the chief command of the Russian army, is reported to be preparing to flee to the east, and is being pursued by the general to his deposition and a possible new attempt to overthrow the provisional government by force.

# 15 LEADERS IN OLD REGIMENT HEAD 50 IN LATEST OUTBREAK

### ONE CONVICT IS SHOT THROUGH LUNG AND THREE GUARDS ARE STABBED; CLUBBED RIFLES OF GUARDS FINALLY REDUCE PRISONERS TO SUBMISSION; TOO MUCH HONOR SYSTEM BREEDS DISORDER NOW BEING COMBATED.

OLNEY, Ill., Sept. 10.—Riots occurred in the state prison here today and yesterday, during which one convict was shot and three guards stabbed.

### WOMEN'S SILENT SYSTEM CUT OFF.

Among the privileges recently enjoyed by the convicts was an almost unlimited correspondence with sentimental women, many of whose letters were made public during an investigation last summer.

### GUARDS CLUB RIFLES.

This morning at the same hour the trouble broke out again. The convicts were finally scattered in the mess hall which followed between the guards and about 15 convicts, three of the guards were stabbed.

### SWEDISH GOVERNMENT PRO-GERMANY.

The Swedish government, with the monarchy, the aristocracy and the army, has been steadily leaning over to the German side since the outbreak of the war. One paper likens Sweden's position to that of Greece a few months ago, saying: "It is a question of German."

### SPYING THROUGH SWEDEN'S AID.

The suspicion has been current in England throughout the war that Germany was obtaining intelligence through the agency of military movements which could not be secured through ordinary spies, the only means available in the more recent stages of the war, particularly since the unrestricted submarine war.

### COMPLIMENTS TO U. S. DIPLOMACY.

The Daily Mail congratulates the American intelligence service on "the most great exploit of this year," and says:

### ADVOCATING HONORABLE PEACE.
