SIGNS FOR THE ROAD TO DEMING

Committee Measures Distances and to Have Signs on Exhibition.

Excellent progress is being made on the Deming cutoff west of Montoya. Adrian Post, chairman of the good roads committee of the chamber of commerce, accompanied by Milton A. Warner and G. A. Martin of the committee, drove over the road as far as the railroad crossing east of Lanark on Thursday afternoon.

Work on the culverts and bridges is now in progress and "Limmy" Newton and his force of men have scraped all the sand out of the road as far as the railroad crossing, which is exactly 29 miles west of El Paso by the new road, a saving of almost four miles over the road as it formerly ran by way of Castille.
