

SEARCHING FOR JOHN LAUGHLIN

Fort Bliss Auto Driver, Missing Since Monday Night, Had Soldiers.

Deputy sheriffs in all directions from El Paso are searching for information of John Laughlin, 18 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Reuben Laughlin, post engineer at Fort Bliss, who has not been seen since 12:15 o'clock Tuesday morning, when he was reported to have been sitting in his automobile, a five passenger Overland, license number 6172, in front of the Yucatec dance hall, near the old Lone Star on the county road in the El Paso valley. He was said to have had a load of soldiers on a trip and was waiting for them to finish darning in the hall.

Deputy Sheriff Notified. Besides the deputy sheriff Scott H. Orndorff's office, the sheriff and provost guard at El Paso have been notified of the boy's disappearance. Shortly before noon today Walter S. Clayton, former alderman, said that he had not been notified from young Laughlin. Mr. Clayton has known the Laughlin family for many years.

The youth is a former high school pupil and has been driving a public service car between Fort Bliss and this city.

TULAROSA WOMAN COMES TO SEEK MISSING SISTER

Nelle Gentry, 28 years of age, who came to this city a month ago from Tularosa, N. M., in search of employment, is missing, according to a report made to the police by Mrs. D. Harris, a sister, Tuesday morning. Mrs. Harris, who also lives in Tularosa, said that Miss Gentry had been writing her regularly, had agreed to meet her at the railroad station here Tuesday morning, and that she had failed to do so. Mrs. Harris returned home Tuesday night, and the police are continuing their search for the girl.

EAST IS THREATENED WITH TEMPORARY SUGAR SHORTAGE

Washington, D. C., Oct. 17.—The food administration today appealed to the American people to reduce consumption of sugar to mitigate the shortage which threatens to extend over the eastern states. No relief is in sight before November, when the Hawaiian and western beet crops reach the market. Failure of the general public to observe conservation recommendations and the export of the product to meet French needs are chiefly responsible for the situation. It is pointed out, however, that the government has received their stocks at prices recently agreed upon there is no reason, it is said, for a price advance during the temporary scarcity.

YAQUINDIANS FIGHT MEXICO TO S. CALIFORNIA

Are on Warpath Along the Yaqui River in Sonora; Troops Rushed In.

Tucson, Ariz., Oct. 17.—Mrs. Julian Johnson today received a letter from her sister in Hermosillo saying that hundreds of Yaqui Indians have taken to the warpath on the Yaqui river, after ordering all Mexican families in the towns to move out at once. The fighting has now been in progress for five days. The state government has been assembling soldiers for some time for a big clean up along the Yaqui river. Two weeks ago three carloads of ammunition to be used in the campaign blew up at Torres. An officer dropped some shells from a cigar, setting off a grenade which set off all the other cars. Many were killed and wounded. The Yaqui, learning that a campaign was contemplated, decided to take the offensive. The government immediately rushed in all the troops it had at its command and fighting is in progress.

TEUTONS MAKING MAPS OF NORTHERN MEXICO, REPORT

Mexican reports today said that the Juarez headquarters late Tuesday that an Austrian who deserted from the United States army at Fort Bliss soon after the declaration of a state of war was made by the United States, is mapping the roads, trails and water holes of northern Chihuahua. He is being assisted by a German, according to the information received, and a map has been made of the trails used by the Germans in pursuit of Villa. Americans arriving here from Chihuahua, which was captured by troops from New York had been appointed secretary of the Chihuahua, Arizona club, which is being organized by the man who said to have come to Mexico to evade the selective draft.

MATAMOROS GARRISON ENCOUNTERS NO BANDITS

Brownsville, Texas, Oct. 17.—Col. Tirza Gonzalez, commander of the Matamoros, Mexico, garrison, who left Matamoros Sunday for a point 90 miles to the south with 100 men, returned to headquarters with his men last night. The expedition was made in automobiles on reports that Mexican bandits were operating in the San Pedro mando district. It was stated last night no bandits were found. No information was received regarding the operations of the followers of Porfirio Gonzalez, who recently was reported to have led a revolution in the Monterey district.

WALTER FOGARTY, 30 YEARS IN SAN LUIS POTOSI, DIES

San Antonio, Texas, Oct. 17.—Walter Fogarty, resident of San Luis Potosi, Mex., for the past 30 years, and former member of the machinery firm of the city, died here at the age of 50 years. He was on his way to New York when he was taken ill here and died Sunday. He was survived by his wife, who was with him, one son, Harry, who is in the British army in France, and one daughter, Mrs. Sanchez. Interment was in a local cemetery.

CARRANZA SAYS MEXICO IS AT PEACE WITH WORLD

Mexico City, Mex., Oct. 17.—In response to an inquiry yesterday from the chamber of commerce regarding the foreign situation, President Carranza said Mexico was at peace with the world and was preserving neutrality. He said a number of resolutions were under way with the United States regarding the connection with gold and silver exports, but that most of these questions probably would soon be covered by a general treaty.

UNABLE TO DETERMINE IF GUANAJUATO WOMEN CAN VOTE

Mexico City, Mex., Oct. 17.—The legislature of the state of Guanajuato is debating whether the women of the new constitution make it possible for women to vote. So far the legislators have come to no conclusion.

SHIPS 5700 BARS OF BELLION FROM MEXICO

Mexico City, Oct. 17.—A large bullion company has shipped to the United States 5700 bars of bullion. This shipment, it is said, is the first of any size sent out by the company from its Mexican smelters in several years.

MESTAS GOES TO LA PAZ TO ASSUME GOVERNORSHIP

Mexico City, Oct. 17.—Gen. Manuel Mestas has been named governor of the lower half of Lower California and has left for La Paz to assume his post.

Mobs Assault Russian Generals Under Arrest For Joining In Revolt

Petrograd, Russia, Oct. 17.—The generals arrested for participation in the Kornilov uprising on their departure from Berditchev, province of Kiev, October 16, were compelled to walk three miles to the railroad station. They were jeered, pelted with missiles and threatened by a mob. The officers barely escaped alive through the strategy of a member of the central guard who started the train out of the station as it was being fired upon by the mob, according to reports just arriving here. Gen. Arloff was struck in the eye by a missile, while Gen. Venoustsky's spine was injured seriously.

APATHY HELD RAGE IN EL PASO

Hoopes Says Bond Situation Appalling; Wichita Falls Oversubscribed.

Dallas, Tex., Oct. 17.—The Liberty loan situation is appalling. These were the opening words of a speech made by E. W. Hoopes, deputy governor of the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas, in charge of the Liberty loan for the 11th district. A meeting of Liberty loan organizers, bankers and other prominent citizens from all over the 11th district was held at the Adolphus Hotel Tuesday. The meeting was convened for the purpose of considering the intensely serious situation brought about by the apparent utter failure on the part of the people to support the loan. During his speech Mr. Hoopes said: "What shall we do to bring the people to a realization of what is happening? If this loan fails, Germany will be encouraged, our allies will be discouraged, our government disgraced and disheartened. Who knows but what it will lead to a general strike, when she would be here in a week. Germany is making a complete victory out of our defeat and here the people of the 11th district will not even lead their own government to protect their business and their children."

German-American Farmers in North Subscribing in Gratifying Numbers.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 17.—All indications today were that subscriptions to the Liberty loan have passed the billion dollar mark. New York's unofficial estimate today was \$112,000,000. The Chicago district claimed at least \$20,000,000. Estimates of other districts are: St. Louis, \$18,000,000; San Francisco, \$32,000,000; Kansas City, \$25,000,000; Minneapolis, \$15,000,000; Dallas, \$12,000,000. Iowa, including Des Moines, \$44,000,000.

German-Americans Buying.

The buying of bonds by farmers of German birth and ancestry is very gratifying, and official message from there said. Great activity in the southwest is reported from Kansas City. A particular drive is being made on pro-Germans, who have sought to intimidate the soldiers of the front. It was said, and the result has been that they are rapidly becoming subscribers.
