CREAM one cup of brown sugar and one-half cup of butter substitute. Add two eggs and beat well; put one teaspoonful of salt into one cup of sour milk; add to the above mixture with two cups of flour and one-half cake of melted chocolate. Bake in two or three layers for the frosting and filling. Put one cup of brown sugar in saucepan with water enough to dissolve and boil until it threads. Pour onto one-well-beaten white of egg and beat until thick, then use.—(Tomorrow—Fried Chicken—Southern.)
