

INJURED MEN GET HALF PAY

United Verde Has a New System; El Pasoan Gets Old Peck Mine.

Jerome, Ariz., April 6.—The United Verde company has adopted a system under which injured employees receive half pay, regardless of the period of incapacity. The company has adopted the two-shift system. The United Verde smelter at Clarkdale is to have material enlargement. The structural steel workers now employed on the United Verde Extension smelter, near Cottonwood, will go at once to Clarkdale on completion of their contract, to start the necessary buildings.

El Pasoan Gets Old Peck. The old Peck silver mine, in the northern Pecos basin, under the control of W. W. The Peck is one of a number of mines around the old camp of Alexandria, where almost pure silver was not an uncommon sight in workings 20 years ago.

Bisbee Leads In Production Of Manganese

Output of District Approximates Thousand Tons Every Week Now.

Bisbee, Ariz., April 6.—High grade manganese mining in the Warren district is at the present time in excess of production being attained in any other Arizona district, and probably in excess of that of any other single district in the country. Around 1000 tons of manganese is now being mined in the district for direct shipment east each month. The Higgins Mining company is perhaps the largest single producer, extracting and shipping about three cars of high grade ore the week. It is taking the ore from the highest working on its property, directly under a high out at the top of the mountain. The ore occurrence is at the surface, as is that of all other manganese in the district. Calumet & Arizona and Copper Queen surface is being worked importantly for this ore. These two companies make up the larger part of the tonnage not supplied by the Higgins. Development of manganese in the Warren district came about under the stimulus provided by the government call for help in obtaining supplies during the war period. Research on the C. & A. ground disclosed the presence of manganese, whereas the search following in pursuing it and like course subsequently being taken by other companies.

HAS \$6,000,000 OF ORE IN SIGHT

Bald Eagle Mine, Considered Worked Out, Found Rich in Ore.

Kingman, Ariz., April 6.—Development drifting along the Bald Eagle vein on Tom Reed ground, at Oatman, has progressed about 250 feet. During the last third of the distance, values were somewhat less than the phenomenal figures known heretofore, yet samples across the vein have averaged \$50 a ton. At least 500 running feet of ore has been proved on the 525 level. The minimum estimate, giving a width of only seven feet, indicates a body of at least 10,000 tons, worth probably \$1,500,000, all developed within the next six weeks. Altogether, this mine is believed to have \$6,000,000 worth of ore in sight, a remarkable figure when it is considered that only a year ago there was local belief that it had been worked out. The mine is turning out monthly a billion worth about \$150,000. The cleanup of a single day was \$7000, from ore that is running around \$27 mill run. Remarkable efficiency has been known in the underground work. An average of 20 feet daily has been made in drifting, with two machines on each face, east and west, and with three shifts employed. Tramping has been a troublesome matter, having been from 2000 to 3500 feet to the Aetco shaft.

Profit of \$100,000 a Month. The United Eastern is turning out a profit of about \$100,000 a month from ore that averages a bit better than \$20 a ton. Report is made of secondary ore cut on the main level by a new drift on the eighth level.

Gold Ore has its mill ready to start with an initial consumption of 100 tons a day of ore that samples around \$15 a ton. This is handled by motor trucks, which already have filled mill bins holding 1200 tons. The company has opened up ten feet of good ore for a distance of 100 feet on the 600 level.

Oatman United has cut about 90 feet of vein matter, getting seams of quartz of good value. The company will go 200 feet deeper, in the hope of more general mineralization. Drilling is being prosecuted in the Toharc and Mohawk Central properties at Oatman. It is hoped on the Telluride ground to cut the main vein of the Tom Reed.

Hackberry 700 Feet in Ore. The old Hackberry mine at the camp of that name, now has been opened to the depth of 700 feet in ore practically from the surface. On the 200 level, drifting is in progress on a vein five feet wide carrying 80 ounces of silver, in native and ruby form, with a small amount of gold. It has been estimated that 200,000 tons are available for milling within the mine, averaging better than 20 ounces of silver, with some values in gold, lead and zinc. The ore body averages 20 feet in width. Plans are being made for the installation of a 200 ton mill with flotation and water concentration.

Movie Theater Reduces Price To The Soldier

Appearance of the Provost Guard Is Followed by a Change in the Sign.

Deming, N. M., April 6.—The moving picture theaters got a taste on Thursday of the fact that the military authority of Camp Coody has can and will regulate the conduct of soldiers when that authority thinks it necessary to protect the fighting men from what it believes to be unreasonably high prices.

Jim Caragan had placed signs over the ticket windows of his Princess and Isis theaters to the effect that afternoon tickets were 20 cents and evening tickets 25 cents instead of 15 cents, the price which the soldiers were allowed to pay. The large majority of Mr. Caragan's customers are soldiers and a provost guard was placed before each theater and soldiers were not allowed to enter. He immediately put up signs reading, "Civilians 15 cents, soldiers, 15 cents," but the guards had not been removed up to about 2 p. m.

A number of service cars began running with signs, "Service car, 10c" on the windows. In fact, in fact, some of them began timidly to run on Wednesday afternoon. A very considerable number of the drivers were said to do considerable talking against these drivers but no more fights or molesting occurred as did on Monday. While some of the cars have left, there appears to be a disposition now among quite a few of them to try out the new rate any way. The situation is expected to adjust itself in the near future, with the drivers acting as individuals in the matter.
