Highlanders Press Paving Matter There

Will See Council and Insist On Bitulithic Company Getting Busy.

The proposed removal of the fire station, street paving and the present condition of the streets in the Highland Park addition, were the principal subjects of discussion at the regular meeting of the Highland Park Civic and Improvement League held at the fire station on Friday evening of the 28th.

The committee on the condition of the roads in Newman Park reported that the trees were looking very bad and chairman D. F. White was instructed to take the matter up with overseer J. C. Sempie, it being the opinion that the trees were suffering from chlorosis and a lack of spraying and attention.

To Get After Council.
The committee composed of D. F. White, Charles Montfort and Robert L. Holliday, regarding street paving and improvements at the fire station, was instructed to take the matter up with the mayor and city council. It was claimed that the paving company was not doing anything to promote or carry out the instructions of the council in signing up the contracts for the paving, and that the property owners were very anxious to have that done in order that the loop on San Diego and Dakota streets might be paved at the earliest opportunity. Property owners were anxiously waiting on the representatives of the Bitulithic Paving company, it was said.

Discuss Proposed Removal.
The matter of moving the fire station as recently proposed, was discussed but referred to a future meeting of the league, it appearing that a majority of the members present were opposed to the move, but preferred more information on the subject before taking action.

The fact that community council No. 1 will hold its regular semi-monthly meeting on the 1st at the fire station Monday night was mentioned. Charles Montfort, president, presided.


