

SOUTH AMERICA NEEDING SHIPS

Trade Almost Paralyzed Because of Heavy Demands for Transports.

Washington, D. C., July 21.—Commercial relations between the United States and South America are in a serious condition because of the war. The lack of shipping has caused a decrease in the amount of manufactured goods exported to Argentina, and the factories of that country are unable to meet the demand.

Materials from Argentina sought by the United States and the other nations at war with Germany include beef, sheep, hide and wool, principally. According to official figures recently issued by the Argentine government there are 17,000,000 sheep in the republic, as compared with 4,000,000 in 1914.

Similar conditions are reported from Chile. Exports from the United States of manufactured goods have been virtually suspended except on a limited number of articles. Complaints are made that a large number of vessels from the United States are being detained at Chilean ports in order to bring nitrate to the United States.

WORK ON BIG POWER PROJECT

300,000 Horsepower More to Be Developed at Niagara Falls.

Buffalo, N. Y., July 21.—One of the greatest water development projects of the many centering about Niagara Falls has been launched on the Canadian side of the river. It contemplates an immediate production of 300,000 electrical horsepower, or equal to approximately one-half the present total development on both sides of the river, and it may expand to 1,000,000 horsepower.

COST OF WATER TO BE FIGURED

High Line Canal Committee Engages in Search for Data as Preliminary.

During the next two months the committee in charge of the high line canal project is to gather data regarding the cost of water supply in other cities of the west, both for domestic and commercial purposes. This was determined on a meeting of the committee at the El Paso chamber of commerce Tuesday afternoon.

All phases of the canal project were discussed at length by G. R. Lellor, G. A. Martin and A. W. Reeves, El Paso committee men, with George M. Clark, representing the upper valley at the meeting, and upon suggestion of Mr. Martin it was agreed by the committee the better plan to follow at this time was to receive all possible data regarding the project, compare the cost of operating the present water works in this city with that of other cities, and determine what would be the cost of the water supply if the high line canal is built.

The value of the high line canal as a valley drainage adjunct was also considered. It was maintained that possible features of the proposed canal for irrigation purposes would also make the canal valuable to the farmers in both upper and lower valleys. In discussing this phase, Mr. Clark brought out the fact that if the canal were brought into cultivation, and when the war is over this land will be ready for occupancy by the soldiers returning from France.

Reclamationists Favor It. Mr. Stevens read a letter from Louis C. Hill, consulting engineer, in which it was said that the construction of the canal was favored by the reclamation officers of the government. Mr. Hill had a conference with Dr. Elworth Mead, chairman of the central committee of the government, and also had conferences lately with A. P. Davis, director and chief construction engineer of the reclamation service, and J. C. Weymouth, construction engineer of Denver, Colo., and that these men were much impressed with the proposed canal and favored its construction.
