

PLAN TO URGE PROHIBITION

County Democratic Conventions to Insist on Legislative Action.

San Angelo, Tex., Aug. 5.—Acting upon the appeal of the governor, it is expected that the county Democratic conventions will instruct their delegates to the state convention to be held at Waco on September 2, to adopt resolutions requesting the 26th legislature to submit an amendment to the constitution providing for prohibition in Texas.

Gov. W. P. Hobby insisted that the convention shall place a plank in the Democratic platform urging the adoption of the amendment. The governor pointed out that in his candidacy for the governorship he pledged himself to favor such an amendment.

Although the governor did not urge the submission of a woman suffrage amendment to the constitution, it is understood that such an amendment will be proposed at the state convention. It is generally understood that the governor favors such an amendment, and as many of the members of the legislature pledged themselves in favor of such an amendment, it is more than likely that both amendments will be submitted at the coming session of the 26th legislature.

The indications are there will be a large percentage of women named as delegates to the convention because it is now apparent that close on 50,000 women voted in the recent Democratic primary election. It is not unlikely, however, that there will be opposition to the suffrage amendment.

Convention In Tom Green Co. Praises Cobb

Urges Party Platform Insuring Clean and Uniform Primary Elections.

San Angelo, Tex., Aug. 5.—Tom Green county, which, on July 27, gave Zach Lamar Cobb a majority of 821 votes over C. B. Hudspeth in the congressional race, Saturday afternoon in the county convention, adopted the following resolution by a vote of 37 to 16:

"That we congratulate Hon. Zach Lamar Cobb, of El Paso, on the legitimate, clean, manly and vigorous campaign made by him for Democratic nomination for congressman from the 15th congressional district of Texas, and upon the stalwart Democracy advocated by him. And we especially congratulate him upon his vigorous support of our great president and of the principles for which Woodrow Wilson stands before the American people and the world."

So as following year on the same subject:

"That we approve legitimate discussion of the platform and official record of a candidate for office, but we uncompromisingly condemn any unwarranted attacks upon the personal character or private life of any candidate."

"To insure Clean Primaries.

"That we call upon the Democratic party of Texas to include in its next platform a plank on primary elections, and to urge legislation as will insure clean and uniform primary elections to the end that local political organizations cannot vote as a bloc for a candidate or measure, ignorant men or women of doubtful citizenship and with no party affiliation."

Another resolution censuring Ferguson's \$15,000 loan, demanded the resignation of any member who supported Ferguson knowing that he had received financial assistance from the brewery association or any of its members, and failed to divulge such information.

H. S. Garrett was chairman of the resolution committee. He is general attorney for the Orient railroad and a strong Cobb supporter.

Majority For Hudspeth In This County, 1089, Official Count Shows

Claude B. Hudspeth defeated Zach Lamar Cobb in El Paso county by only 1089 votes, 123 less than the first reports indicated. The final official count was made Saturday by the county Democratic committee. Full returns from the entire district are not in, but the Hudspeth majority is now estimated at about 1200 in the district, including El Paso.

ANOTHER CERTIFICATE ISSUE IS ANNOUNCED

Dallas, Texas, Aug. 5.—The fourth offering of treasury certificates in anticipation of the coming Liberty loan has been announced, according to Nathan Adams sales director for the Dallas reserve district. The allotment for this district was again fixed at \$12,000,000. The certificates will be dated August 6 and maturing December 5 and will bear interest at 4 1/2 percent a year.

Mr. Adams said eight other districts exceeded their allotments, thus showing it was possible for banks in some sections to render assistance to others in less favored sections and that the same condition was true within the district.

He emphasized the statement however that those banks which had thus received assistance ought to begin recirculating and that every banker ought to feel a pride in having his district subscribe its full quota. He said that the government's need is paramount over all others.

DEMOCRATS FOR ISSUES OF WAR

Patriotism Keynote of the County Convention; Delegates to Waco Named.

Patriotism was the dominant note at El Paso county's Democratic convention, Saturday afternoon in the 15th district courtroom. It was the first convention in this county at which women participated and the occasion was made doubly memorable by the nature of the resolutions passed unanimously, by rising votes. They endorsed the national administration and the conduct of the war, expressed pleasure at the nomination of W. P. Hobby for governor, and instructed delegates to the state convention to vote for planks calling for submission of prohibition and woman suffrage amendments to the constitution for rearrangement of the state school system, as well as for the elimination of the alien vote. Hudspeth supporters controlled the convention.

Asks Differences Be Dropped.

The convention was called to order by county chairman J. J. Kaster, who appointed R. E. Holliday temporary chairman and Harris Wallfish temporary secretary, both of whom were made permanent in his opening talk. Mr. Holliday expressed the hope that Democrats would patch up all pre-primary differences and work together for the good of the party. He thereupon appointed committees as follows:

On credentials—J. J. Kaster, Ponder S. Carter, Joseph D. Pace, Mesdames J. A. Foster and W. A. Boynton.

On permanent organization—Judge Adrian Pool, J. E. Quaid, Roy M. Walker, Mesdames O. A. Critchett and J. L. Ely.

Hopes for Reunited Democracy.

With the committees were in session, R. E. Holliday, for the election of whom as speaker of the house a vigorous campaign is being waged, was called on for a short talk. "This is the time for a love feast," he said. "We should have a united, or a reunited, Democracy. In order that the Republicans, if there be such animals in these parts, shall go down in overwhelming defeat."

Tribute to President.

"This is also the time to pay tribute to our chief, Woodrow Wilson, and to say that the people of El Paso are behind him to the limit. It won't be long before the Stars and Stripes are flying over the royal palace at Berlin and the thing for us to do as loyal Americans and loyal Texans is to get behind the boys over the sea to do that we must have good government at home, and Texas made a great stride to that end last Saturday when Hobby was nominated for governor by an overwhelming majority."

Endorse Thomason's Candidacy.

Mr. Thomason concluded his talk with a plea that woman suffrage and prohibition be written in the state platform. Following his talk, J. J. Kaster moved that Mr. Thomason's candidacy for speaker be endorsed, which was done by a unanimous rising vote.

J. J. Kaster then declared that in accordance with an opinion from the state attorney general, he would deliver to Joseph D. Pace, the new county chairman, funds remaining from the first primary, to be used in financing the run off.

Convention Has 122 Votes.

The committee, headed by Mr. Thomason, then reported, and their action was adopted, as stated above. J. E. Quaid reported for the permanent organization committee, that the temporary officers be made permanent. This was adopted. J. J. Kaster, credentials committee, reported that 122 votes were accredited to the convention.

A brief talk was then made by Mrs. O. A. Critchett, who said "the women of El Paso are glad that a man of Mr. Thomason's type will be the next speaker of the house. We have worked long and hard for suffrage in Texas and we want men who will see to that end to effect."

Convention Delegates Named.

Delegates were then named for the state convention at Waco, as follows: In the case of W. H. Burgess, now of Chicago, his name was placed in the list on motion of Judge Adrian Pool, who said Mr. Burgess is "still an El Pasoan, but temporarily sojourning in Chicago. The delegates chosen were:

Nealon Fights Martin.

J. M. Nealon, chairman of the committee to report the names of delegates, made a fight in the committee against the name of G. A. Martin going on the list of delegates to the state convention, and after he had been voted down by every other member of the committee, refused to present the list to the convention, designating J. E. Quaid to do so. Nealon threatened at one time to take it to the floor of the convention if the name of Martin was presented, whereupon Judge Adrian Pool accepted the challenge and invited him to do so if he wished. Nealon was one of the closest supporters of C. B. Hudspeth in the recent campaign and made some speeches for him in Tom Green county, which Hudspeth lost to Cobb by the biggest majority of any county in the district.

Instrumented for Carleton.

Delegates were instructed to vote for O. S. Carleton, of Dallas, for state chairman. Mr. Carleton was president in the ranks of those who supported Hobby for governor. The El Paso delegates were also instructed to vote as a unit on all questions before the state convention which will be held at Waco September 2.

"You Will Have To Make Good" Says Col. Roosevelt

Dark Harbor, Me., Aug. 5.—Former president Roosevelt came out of the seclusion of his vacation retreat here on the Maine coast to deliver a stirring patriotic message Sunday.

"We are at the crisis of civilization," he said. "It is for all men and women in America to decide whether they shall hold their heads high and whether they shall so act as never again to be able to look into the faces of other nations."

An illustration of the benefit of this service, typical of hundreds, may be cited. An employer, having a government contract, requested that 400 men be furnished immediately. Upon investigation it was found that not only were housing facilities lacking, but the employer would not need the men for several weeks. Because the government handled the job the men were sent at the right time, housing facilities were provided, and there was no loss of time or money to workers or employer.

The use of the U. S. Employment Service by both employers and workers is a patriotic service and duty to the government.

Therefore, I solemnly urge all employers engaged in war work to refrain after August 1st, 1918, from recruiting unskilled labor in any manner except through this central agency. [U. S. Employment Service.] I urge labor to respond as loyally as heretofore to any calls issued by this agency for voluntary enlistment in essential industry. And I ask them both alike to remember that no sacrifice will have been in vain, if we are able to prove beyond all question that the highest and best form of efficiency is the spontaneous co-operation of a free people."
