

HUN WAR DIET ENDS OBESITY

Large Numbers Find Way to Better Health, Says German Professor.

Amsterdam, Holland, Sept. 28.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—War diet in Germany has accomplished a greater reduction of the corpulence of the average German than all the Marienbad cures, Russian baths and drastic courses of exercise.

Some Lose 100 Pounds. "I have known people," says Prof. Albin, "who in two years' time dropped 50 to 100 pounds so that their friends scarcely knew them. They could almost cut up an old suit and make two new ones out of the material, without having to bother about a clothes card."

The writer emphasizes that this attention is not due to under nourishment alone. A very great deal is due, he says, to unaccustomed bodily exertion and severe mental strain. Sorrow and vexation, the thousand and one domestic worries and troubles caused by the war tend to prevent the formation of flesh.

Can Eat Anything. Prof. Albin says he has found a distinct improvement in the state of health of diabetics, who can now eat with impunity bread, potatoes and other foodstuffs that were formerly taboo to them.

Sufferers from gout have also benefited by the reduction in the meat diet and by the enforced abstinence from alcoholic liquors. Rheumatism, especially of the muscles, has also become rarer.

All sorts of slight nervous ailments, especially among women have disappeared because less attention is being paid to them in these strenuous times.

Polish Priests Jailed By Germans Because the Church Bells Are Gone

Zarich, Switzerland, Sept. 28.—Several Polish Roman Catholic priests, together with leading members of their congregations, have been imprisoned by the Germans because they concealed church bells to prevent their confiscation by the German military authorities. Warsaw papers report. The prisoners have been told they would have to remain in jail until the bells were found.

French Writer Praises Kindness Of Americans

Paris, France, Sept. 28.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—Leon Daudet, son of Alphonse Daudet and editor of the Action Francaise recently visited some scenes of American activity behind the lines and his enthusiasm is unbounded. "What cordial frankness they show," he writes of the American soldiers. "To the inhabitants they offer their bread, preserves and cigars with a charming gentleness which seems to say 'Are we not brothers?' They are full of politeness to every woman, no matter what her age, and of kindness to every child."

TWO AIRMEN ARE INJURED, PLANE RUINED IN CRASH

Brenham, Texas, Sept. 28.—Lieut. F. N. Carlson of Loda, Ill., was seriously injured and two airplanes of a squadron of eight machines from Ellington field, Houston, were badly damaged and one virtually demolished at Phillipsburg, six miles south of Brenham, at noon Friday. The accidents were due to squally weather, which forced the machines into fences when they alighted.

TWO MORE FLIERS KILLED AT TALIAPFERO FIELD

Fort Worth, Tex., Sept. 28.—Second Lieut. George W. Killorin, Jr., of Wakefield, Mass., aged 23, and Robert Mack of Wadsworth, Ind., aged 24, were killed Friday when their plane fell at Taliapfero field. Both were attached to the school of aerial gunnery. Killorin was the son of a prominent merchant living at Wakefield, Mass.

WOULD PERMIT COMMANDER TO REMIT DEATH SENTENCE

Washington, D. C., Sept. 28.—An amendment to amend the fifth article of war so that the commanding general in the field, department or division can mitigate or remit any sentence of death or dismissal, instead of leaving it to the president, was recommended to congress Friday by the war department. The change was urged by Gen. Pershing.

HUGO BRIESH FEELS NEED OF RED CROSS UNDERWEAR
