

RUTHLESS HUNS DEAF TO PLEAS

Wilfully Burn or Mine All Houses in Some Towns Before Evacuating.

With French Army in Belgium and France, Oct. 24.—Detachments of engineers from Gen. Gouraud's army, in exploring the regions from which the Germans have been driven in this sector, have discovered in many villages evidence of the method by which the destruction of dwellings and public buildings was organized.

How to Destroy Shells.

In mines where house were still erect, they were mined for slow destruction. Orders for the burning of Junville, a large village in the valley of the Re-tourne, arrived on the day of the evacuation. The people pleaded with the officers to spare their homes, but the torch was put to every house. The village was one vast bonfire when the French entered it.

Fill Wells With Rock.

French engineers are filling the cellar of every house remaining intact in this region. Under most of them mines have been laid. Most of the wells were so mined that explo-

Huge Military Deficiency Bill Before Senate

Washington, D. C., Oct. 24.—The military deficiency bill, carrying \$6,345,727,334, a slight decrease from the original house draft, was reported to the senate today by the appropriations committee.

Enemy Trade Act Amended.

A section amending the trading with enemy act, to give alien property custodian authority to take over property held by an enemy, or an ally of an enemy, not holding license with the United States, was inserted.

Senator Charles Smart, Utah, sharply opposed a provision giving permanent status to the employees in the naturalization service regardless of their length of service.
