

CAN BUILD TWO ARIZONA ROADS

Others Are to Be Held Up, It Seems, Under the Essential Work Rule.

Phoenix, Ariz., Oct. 31.—Apparently the Phoenix-Tempe and the Bisbee-Douglas highways are the only roads that are to be built in Arizona till the United States highway council shall have changed its determination concerning essential work in the southwest.

Reads held up include those from Wilcox to Globe, from Globe to Benson, from Benson to the west Cochise county line, from Douglas east toward El Paso, a stretch of 17 miles from Agua Caliente to Antelope Hill on the Phoenix-Yuma road, and from Mesa to Superior on the high line, the last avoiding an almost impassable desert stretch.

Big City Park To Be Made An Attractive Spot

Alderman Griffith Says the Playgrounds and Zoo For Whole Public.

"Having been placed in charge of the city parks by mayor Davis," said alderman W. T. Griffith, "I made my first inspection of them Tuesday with park commissioner J. W. Fisher, and experienced an agreeable surprise that I believe most any citizen would feel who had never stopped to consider that El Paso has a real system of splendidly kept parks of which cities of much greater size might feel proud."

"It is the intention of the mayor and council to make of Washington park a real recreation center, where all the people can go for their outing, and where picnicking will be a real pleasure. Our plans include arranging two baseball diamonds, two tennis courts, a permanent grandstand, permanent and artistic cages and runways for the animals, where they will be readily accessible to the public, and a general beautifying of the whole park."

Schools Reopen Monday; Full Pay For All Teachers

Principals to Meet With Mr. Tighe Friday; Buildings All Clean.

Unless the board of health of the city rules otherwise, all public schools north of the tracks will reopen Monday morning and preparations to that end were in progress Thursday.

"All the schools have been thoroughly ventilated and cleaned," said Supt. R. J. Tighe, Thursday morning, "and the buildings were never in better condition, for the janitors have had nothing to do for three weeks but scrub, wash and dust the rooms. More time has been put in on the buildings than in ever given them for reopening after vacation. The windows have been open in all the buildings since the abandonment of the schools, and trust that the attendance will be full when the schools reopen Monday, for there is considerable interest in studies by the pupils."

Replying to a question if the schools would remain in session six days a week to make up for lost time, Mr. Tighe said: "That matter has not been decided, although it has been discussed by the board. Many of the boys work on Saturdays and if it is possible to make up the six days, it would be desirable. Saturday sessions this will be done. I believe this will be possible."

Teachers Get Full Pay. All teachers are to be paid full time for the period the schools have been closed and their checks will be delivered to them Friday morning at the office of the superintendent in the Bailey school.

Immediately following, at 10 o'clock, Mr. Tighe wishes to meet all the principals of the city schools and have a conference with them.

Gen. Enriquez Now Governor For Chihuahua Gen. Murguia Is Also Back In Chihuahua, But No Trouble Expected.

Chihuahua, Mex., Oct. 31.—Gen. Enriquez has arrived here from Mexico City and taken charge of the state government. It is said that everything has been favorably settled.

Gen. Murguia is also here, having also arrived from Jimenez. Villal's whereabouts are unknown and it is said that he is suffering from an acute attack of indigestion.

The military committee, under instructions from the directors, has secured leases on a large acreage of land south and east of Fort Bliss for five years with the privilege of renewing for another five year period in event the lands are needed for military purposes. As the leases entail the expenditure of money, the directors with the approval of the membership of the chamber of their action.

These lands are to be tendered to the war department through Gen. J. J. Harbrook, commander of the district, as an evidence of the good faith of El Paso. The government is to be asked to make what use it will of these lands. Some of the land is wooded and is being used by the men here as a place to hunt, of which there are to be 5000. The rest of the land will afford ample space for the maneuver of cavalry or artillery.

New Rules For Export Of Animal Fats; Other Articles Are Conserved

Beginning Nov. 1, application for export in animal and vegetable greases and fats must state degree of hardness, otherwise will be considered above 40 degrees and refused, said an announcement of the war trade board, through John A. Wright, local agent.

Licenses issued after Oct. 31 shall state: "This license is not valid unless presented to the collector of customs with a certificate from the inspector of the bureau of animal industry of the United States department of agriculture, showing that the degree of hardness conforms to the description given on this license."

The war trade board has announced the addition of the following commodities to the export conservation list effective Oct. 31: Manufacture of braided rope packing, compressed sheet packing, pipe and boiler covering (containing 85 percent or more of magnesia); rope packing; wick packing; saw and saw flour.

The addition of the following commodities to the export conservation list effective Oct. 31: Cleaning and shelling tools for cartridges and shells.

INTERSTATE TRUCK TIRE EVENT

Good Roads Meet at Juarez Develops Brotherly Feeling and Big Project.

Originating merely as a luncheon in honor of visiting Bankhead highway pathfinders, the meeting in Juarez on Wednesday took on the nature of an international amity gathering, and out of it was born an international highway project.

A. Escudero, president of the Juarez chamber of commerce, told of plans on foot to construct an automobile highway between Mexico City and Juarez, to connect here with the Bankhead highway and thus the matter of communication has taken official cognizance of the road and is having it surveyed. The road has already been completed between Mexico City and Queretaro, he said.

Regard Americans as Brothers. Rafael Solana, secretary of the Juarez chamber of commerce, said the Mexicans looked to the Americans as their brothers and that the Mexicans admired the Americans as the greatest fighters the world had ever known. He said he was glad to see conditions growing better between the people of Juarez and El Paso daily, and predicted a brotherly friendship soon.

Must Understand Mexicans. Judge D. A. Richardson, of Douglas, Ariz., who said he had been reared in Mexico and is a graduate of the law department of the University of Mexico City, said the day would soon come when the people of Mexico and the United States would understand each other better, when they would be fast friends. "We do not understand each other," he said. "There is no kinder person in the world than the Mexican—he will give you half of what he has for the asking and all that he has for nothing. We must learn to love him for his good qualities. The day is coming, if we try when to insult the United States will mean to insult Mexico and when to insult Mexico will mean to insult the United States. The day is coming when no puppy of an American will speak of a greaser and no whip of a Mexican will speak of a gringo. There is no hatred. It is too petty for people who have such a broad outlook on life."

Others spoke along similar lines, and, although the meeting was in the interest of good roads, the speaking was not confined to good roads.

Has Government Road Vision. Talking on the subject of good roads, however, E. G. Perry, of Lubbock, said it would be possible in no great time to leave Fort Bliss, Okla., this morning by truck loaded with troops and army supplies and reach them in Fort Bliss the next morning. He predicted that El Pasoans in 72 hours by truck would be in the capital steps in Washington and salute the flag on the capitol of the greatest following among the workingmen and all social classes, and his election is probable.

Pool Favors All-Texas. Judge Adrian Pool, who presided at the meeting, favored the route from Little Rock down to Texarkana and thence into El Paso through Fort Worth, Big Springs and Pecos.

Talks were also made by W. G. Roe, E. C. Davis and G. A. Martin, of El Paso; R. A. Kirk, of Phoenix, and several other guests of Mexico.

The pathfinder party, accompanied by Judge Adrian Pool, left for Lubbock Thursday morning for Pecos, Texas, in cars furnished by F. M. Hannell, of the El Paso Overland company, and G. C. Perry, of the Lone Star Motor company.

R. A. Kirk, of Phoenix, Judge Fred Sutter, of El Paso, and Judge J. A. Richardson, of Douglas, who were the Arizona representatives sent to El Paso to confer with the Bankhead highway commission, left for their homes Thursday.
