

641 U. S. ARMY CASUALTIES NAME 14 SOUTHWESTERN MEN

Two of 17 Reported Killed in Action Were Texans; 26 Die of Disease; 113 Wounded Severely; 260 Wounded Slightly; 182 Wounded, Degree Undetermined; Missing in Action, 31; One Arizona Man in List.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 1.—The army casualty list for today contains 641 names, divided as follows: Killed in action, 17; died of wounds, 17; died from airplane accident, 1; died of disease, 26; wounded severely, 113; wounded slightly, 260; missing in action, 31; wounded, degree undetermined, 182.

The following southwestern men are named: Killed in Action, Pvt. John Daly, Houston, Tex.

FINE CHANGE TO GET COMMISSION

Man Who Enters Camp Fremont to Have Quick Training in Fine Climate.

Candidates for the infantry officers' training camp at Camp Fremont, Cal., accepted by Lieut. Col. R. G. Elliott, Fifth cavalry, officer examiner detailed to furnish students from west Texas, with office in room 461 court-house, will have an unusual opportunity to receive their training in two months in a fine climate and will go to duty with troops in the new divisions forming all over the country from this fall and winter's draft as soon as they get their lieutenantcies. Col. Elliott said Friday morning: "These graduates quite promptly will see service with infantry troops before the officer students in cavalry now training in Texas will be assigned."

Unprecedented Opportunity. "The war is not over yet and there is a need for good officers in the army that will extend many months, whatever the outcome of the negotiations between the belligerents," said Col. Elliott. "Never has there been such an opportunity as this infantry officers' camp at 23,000 men, open to the military student, or man who expects to be drafted this fall. We won't turn down the youngsters who show up well physically and with educational requirements. Good men with talent will unquestionably go forward to higher grades than second lieutenant. Promotion is very rapid in the army if any man should fall at Camp Fremont. The course of the best training the American army can give, surrounded by conditions that are almost ideal, winter camps, but there will be thousands chosen to lead troops all over the world. No delay for men taken."

No Delay For Men Taken. Col. Elliott is receiving many applications, giving preference to those who wish to go to Camp Fremont, Dec. 1, over those applicants who prefer field artillery or machine gunnery at other schools established. He said that men he approves will most likely go at once to Camp Fremont, as there will be no delay. He said there have been at other camps, after men have been designated by examining officers.

Crowder Calls 1100 Men For U. S. Navy. Washington, D. C., Nov. 1.—Provost marshal general Crowder today called 1100 men for the service in the navy, to entrain from 18 states and the district of Columbia by November 5. Volunteer inductions will be accepted until November 5.

ARMY BEING SEARCHED FOR BEST MEN FOR COMMISSIONS. All enlisted men in the army who are mentally and physically qualified and who apply for admission in the training schools for officers will be accepted hereafter, regardless of the number, it was announced at military headquarters Thursday. The army is being thoroughly searched for material for officers and there is an excellent opportunity for men now coming in to be selected for training. The time limit for applications from enlisted men for commissions to these several training schools for prospective officers has been extended from Nov. 8 to 12, according to announcement made at headquarters of the southern department. No time is specified for the candidates to have served as enlisted men, all now deemed necessary is ability.

CORP. J. R. PRUETT, IN 18TH FIELD ARTILLERY, WOUNDED. Corp. J. R. Pruett, serving with the 18th field artillery, organized at Fort Bliss, was slightly wounded in action in the fighting zone in France about the first of October, according to a letter from his mother, Oct. 12, to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Pruett, 2115 Whelpling street, this city. He was in a base hospital when he wrote and said his wound had been attended, his captain seeing personally to it. Mr. Pruett, father of the boy, is vice president of the Madra company and the Mexico North Western Railroad Co. Mrs. Pruett said Friday that the boy had enlisted in the 18th field artillery here and went overseas last March.
