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

14 Years Ago Today

From The Herald of This Date, 1904.

GOV. PARDEE, of California, is elected as president of the National Irrigation congress, and Portland, Ore., is chosen as the meeting place for next year. A grand ball will be held in the convention hall this evening for the delegates.

Twenty-two large gas tanks in the big railway gas charging station in Chicago explode and a score of people are killed, eight bodies being recovered from the ruins. Fires start in surrounding yards and render things precarious for a while.

A large magazine is exploded at Port Arthur, the Japs are reinforced and the city is expected to fall soon. Gen. Shensel, in command of the garrison, sends a message of cheer to the Russian car on his birthday, and gives assurance of his determination to hold the fort.

Fire is sweeping the fiers of the White Star line at Boston and is gaining against the efforts of the firemen. Damage is estimated at the present time to reach \$500,000.

The large freight steamer Mohawk takes fire and burns at Horton's Point, Long Island. No lives are lost.

Three hundred cottages and the tabernacle were burned today at Chautauque grounds at Urbana, O., through carelessness in burning rubbish on the grounds.

Dan Patch lowers the world's mile pacing record at Oklahoma City to 2:32, the previous record being 2:33, held by Almonzo.

Continued trouble at Panama necessitated the landing of United States marines, and reports indicate that things are now quiet and no more trouble is expected.

The railroads that laid off employees before the election are now taking them back.

Adolph J. Weber, of Auburn, Calif., is charged with shooting and killing his father, mother and sister and beating to death his brother.

Gov. Enrique Creel, of Chihuahua, visits Hotel Dies and his impressions are that it is the best appointed hospital he has ever seen. He will send the Mexican national band to the hospital this evening for concert.

ANNAPOLIS HOPS. THE old town of Annapolis, where the United States Naval academy is located, has the singular good fortune to be visited at regular intervals by throngs of girls as carefully selected for looks as a Dierfeld chorus followed by worried chaperones and teams full of beautiful frocks, they brighten the streets with fluttering color, like a flight of migrating butterflies. They are the guests of the midshipmen, come to attend the "hops," and the remarkably high average of their looks is due to the fact that each middle naturally sends for the prettiest girl he knows.

The midshipman of the American navy is trained in gallantry toward the women as well as toward the enemy. Even during the war, informal hops were held at the Naval academy every Saturday night, while formal or "cock" hops occur once or twice a month. It is these latter which draw upon the beauty of the whole eastern United States. For their informal dances the midshipmen are forced to rely upon such feminine charm as the country towns of Baltimore and Washington can furnish.
