NATIONALIZATION OF COAL MINES IN U. S. IS URGED BY HAYES

Recommendations At Indianapolis Conference of United Mine Workers' Policy Committee Include Six Hour Work Day, Five Day Week, Increase In The Wages, Right To Bargain Collectively With Government.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., March 18.—Recommendations for a six hour work day, a five day week, an increase in wages of miners and nationalization of coal mines of the country were made today by Frank J. Hayes, president of the United Mine Workers of America, in his address at the opening session of the policy committee of the organization today. He also recommended that miners have the right to organize and bargain collectively with the government in case of nationalization of mines.

Kemp Resigns From The Civil Service Board

States That He Cannot Give Time To Commission That It Deserves.

MAURICE KEMP tendered to mayor Charles Davis Tuesday his resignation as a member of the civil service commission. Mr. Kemp stated that he felt that owing to the pressure of his law business, the board cannot give the commission the time it deserves and he is of the opinion that another member should be appointed. His resignation has not been accepted by mayor Davis, who stated that he desired to talk to Mr. Kemp and retain him as commissioner.

Gasoline Costs Only 20 Cents In Kansas City

Auto Club Of That City Has Standing Reward For Auto Thieves.

GASOLINE costs only 20 cents per gallon in Kansas City, where the Automobile club has a membership of 5000, and a standing reward of \$15 for the arrest and conviction of automobile thieves, according to H. L. Albaugh, president of the club, who was in El Paso Monday night, accompanied by his family. Mr. Albaugh will remain in the city for several days, having made a trip by automobile through the northwest and California since leaving Kansas City eight months ago.

ASKS FOR RAISING ON BEER ORDER

Can Brew With More Than Half Of One Percent Alcohol Be Sold?

DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE QUERIED Brewers Throughout U. S. May Follow New Yorkers In Ignoring Ban.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 18.—Whether the internal revenue bureau has authority to enforce its rules against the sale of beer, containing 1/2 of 1 percent or more of alcohol, will be put up to the department of justice. Internal revenue commissioner Roger today decided to ask for an opinion on the subject.

The question was raised by announcement of New York brewers that they would resume manufacture and sale of beer containing not more than 1/2 percent alcohol, considering this nonintoxicating.

Revenue bureau officials explained today that the 1/2 of 1 percent limit prescribed by that rule is based on precedent and on court decisions of a number of states. State laws and regulations vary, however, and commissioner Roger said he knew specifically of no federal law or court decision which set the limit of alcoholic content for non-intoxicating beer.

As soon as the solicitor of the revenue bureau and the department of justice have rendered opinions, commissioner Roger will determine whether to enforce the 1/2 of 1 percent rule, revenue officials said. They are waiting for the ruling of the department of justice.

Phoenix, Ariz., March 18.—Mrs. May Glenn, accused of the murder of her husband, Robert Glenn, at a party in Phoenix last Christmas night, took the stand in her own behalf today and in answer to her attorney's questions as to whether her husband ever had threatened to kill her, replied: "Yes, a thousand times."

Miner's Home Blown Up As Occupants Sleep, But None Is Injured.

Butte, Mont., March 18.—The home of John Turner, a miner, was dynamited early today while Mr. and Mrs. Turner and three children were asleep. The building was damaged, but the occupants were unharmed. No motive for the attack is known.

PORT NATIONALIZED; BUENOS AIRES WORKERS WILL RETURN. Buenos Aires, Argentina, March 18.—Trans-Atlantic shipping agents have accepted the government's decree in nationalizing the port and announcing that trans-Atlantic steamers will be brought in from the roads today for loading and unloading. The workmen have agreed to return to work under the government's decree, and it is hoped to bring about normal conditions within a few days.

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Because They Face Vastly Better Conditions, Attendance Is Large.

Dallas, Texas, March 18.—Texas cattle raisers, here for the 49th annual convention, are facing vastly better conditions for their industry than they were a year ago, in the opinion of many of them. For this reason the attendance is larger than any convention for some years.

To Consider Conditions Caused By Rising Prices Of Pork In United States.

Washington, D. C., March 18.—Conditions caused by rising prices of hogs and pork products will be considered at a conference next Thursday at the food administration's grain corporation offices in New York by Messrs. Frederick S. Snyder, former head of the meat division, and Edgar Rickard, acting food administrator during Herbert Hoover's absence, and Ben S. Allen, of the food administration.

Glass Makes Stinging Reply To Congressman. Washington, D. C., March 18.—Secretary Glass returned to representative McPherson of Pennsylvania, a letter last night by Mr. McPherson last Friday, asking that John Skelton Williams be retained as controller of the currency after the senate failed to act on his re-nomination. Mr. Glass wrote that he did not care to keep the letter for his files, and added:

Mob Of 10,000 Stones Korean Railway Depot.

Independence Movement Is Remarkably Extensive; Flag Displayed.

Tokyo, Japan, March 18.—By Associated Press.—Korean demonstrations continued Saturday and Sunday, according to dispatches printed in newspapers, and it is indicated the national independence movement is remarkably extensive and well organized in some of the strongest provinces of that country. Reports state that the railway station at Ping Yang has been stoned by a mob of 10,000 persons, the Korean national flag being hoisted on the station.
