

3 MORE TROOP SHIPS COME IN

Texas Casuals Arrive On Venezia; 40th Division Troops Now En Route.

New York, March 25.—With 1484 troops, all casuals, the steamship Venezia arrived here today from Marcelline, Marines, regular army and all other branches of the American expeditionary force were represented.

Many Sick and Wounded. Among the 1233 troops arriving from St. Nazaire on the transport Southampton were 210 sick and wounded officers and men, of whom 39 were bedridden.

With 8812 troops, the transport George Washington arrived from France. Units included a detachment from the 53th service company, signal corps, and the following casual companies: Nos. 112 and 114, California; 142, Washington state, and five others and 625 men and 61 nurses.

More Men of 40th Div. Washington, D. C., March 25.—Additional units of the 36th, 31st and 40th divisions have sailed from France. The war department announced the departure of transports carrying detachments of three divisions.

The troops in the 48th and 51st divisions are from Pacific coast and western states and Alaska. The transport Edgar A. Luckenbach, due at New York April 2, has headquarters troop of the 48th division, 11th train headquarters, headquarters detachment, headquarters company, supply company and machine gun detachment of the 18th Infantry. The majority of those units are en route to Camp Kearny, Calif.

Russian soviet authorities alleged had been held by the French at Saloniki. Non-Socialist Bank soviet. Vienna, Austria, March 25.—(By the Associated Press).—A dispatch to the Vienna Eris Presse declares that all the non-Socialist parties in Hungary will support the new government for the reason, it is said, that it has decided to act against the entente. The rural population is reported to have gone to the non-Socialist communists.

A dispatch to the Neue Freie Presse says that the British-French mission at Budapest, consisting of 240 men, has been dispersed and that a wireless message has been sent to Nikolai Lenin, the Russian Bolshevik leader, by the Russian Bolshevik press, announcing that the entente missions have left Budapest. The message added: "The French troops dispersed by Bolsheviks have been dispersed by our mutinies have occurred in some French provinces."

The executive committee of the workers' council of German-Austria, replying to the proclamation of the Hungarian soviet government, is of the opinion that after the collapse of imperialism in Germany and Austria-Hungary, the imperialist dictators are our chief enemies. If the Paris conference seeks to offer violence to entire nations and violation of the right of self-determination, it will meet with determined resistance from the workers."

Says Power Gained Entente. Coppenhagen, Denmark, March 25.—The claims of the Hungarian soviet government to power, as set forth in a wireless message, are largely untrue, according to a Vienna dispatch to the Arbeiter Abendblatt. A peasant soviet in Hungary has been formed in the country, it is declared, has not yet received upon a soviet republic. An official statement from Budapest, dated March 24, derogated reports from the province showed that peace and order were prevailing.

Through Hospital Train On Way To Camp Kearny. New York, March 25.—The first hospital train of the army medical department to go from New York City to the Pacific coast left here late Monday. It carried 127 wounded men to Camp Kearney, Calif., where they will be kept until well enough to be sent to their homes.

ILL HEROES ON WAY TO KEARNY

Gasped and Wounded Men See Humorous Side of the War.

"Nothing could have withstood the Yankee doughboys as they poured over the top toward the German trenches, much less an instinctive 'Heils,' said Louis C. Hughes, of Atlanta, Ga., with seven of his comrades of the first division, passed through El Paso Tuesday en route to Camp Kearny, Calif., to recuperate from wounds received in battle in France. Hughes was in every battle of the war up to a month before the armistice was declared, when he was wounded and gassed in the battle of Argonne forest. He has a wound in the left hip and as a souvenir retains the piece of shell removed from the wound.

Nurses in Gassed. Louis Nixson, another member of the party, was overseas 11 months, but eight months were spent with the 7th army of the first expeditionary force. He helped in the taking of the Lorraine motor, the first chance the Americans had of observing what kind of stuff they were made of and was on the St. Quentin front for two months, where he was wounded in the right leg and gassed.

War Yards. In relating some of the anecdotes of the war, Moldovan said: "In one of the French villages an officer stopped a soldier of the 1st division, who was without a blouse, and asked him where it was, and the private replied: 'In No Man's Land, your village here, where your's ought to be.'"

PART OF 36TH IS AT FORT WORTH Much of Former Texas National Guard Ready For Demobilization. A number of units of the 36th division, which contains practically all the old Texas national guard, have arrived at Camp Bowie, Fort Worth, for demobilization, according to unofficial information received from army sources.

TEXAS INFANTRY. The first field artillery, which is a part of this division, and was formerly the First Texas field artillery, has been sent on to San Antonio for discharge. T. J. McCann and also a supply company commanded by Capt. W. W. Wray, are in El Paso, and form part of the 36th division.

Stevenson, which is also a part of this division, arrived at Newport News several days ago, and is scheduled for immediate demobilization. No troops are to be sent to Camp Kearny, whether the remaining El Paso troops are en route home.

P. Morgan. One of his duties will be to pilot the ranchmaster to distant parts of the property in an airplane, which will be equipped with wireless for communication with the ranch headquarters.

WIFE, DAUGHTERS OUTRAGED. SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., March 25.—(By the Associated Press).—The wife and two daughters of the former emperor of Russia and his wife and daughters, under particularly revolting conditions by Bolshevik troops, was made here by Gen. Robert C. Paris, one of the first French officers to be assigned to the Caschovka, near the Russian border. Paris is on his way home to make a report of the occurrence to the French government. He arrived here Sunday from Vladivostok. Nicholas and his family were shot in the basement of the House of Winterburg, Siberia. Greek Premier Has Orderlies In Gay Attire

Costumes Of Venizelos's Cretan Guards Create Furor In Paris.

Paris, France, March 25.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press).—King, president and premier have ceased to be a novelty at the peace conference, but the bodyguard of premier Venizelos, of Greece, never fails to attract great crowds. At the hotel where the American delegation is housed and at the foreign office, Venizelos's approach is always heralded by the arrival of his Cretan soldiers arrayed more brilliantly than a comic opera band.

Gay Uniform. The Cretans who escort the Greek statesman are all more than six feet tall and apparently have been chosen from various organizations, as a different group appears daily, but the same uniform is never seen twice. The swarthy Cretans all have small mustaches, their hair is cut in a crew cut and stand rigidly at attention for hours while awaiting M. Venizelos at the entrance of the foreign office. The jobs of small boys and the jobs of the various allied soldiers who gather in wickerwork chairs to disturb the imperious Cretans.

A Gay Uniform. Perhaps the most startling uniform worn by one of the guards consisted of white tights bound by tasseled black silk cords at the knee, a red velvet blouse and a red fez set mounted by a black silk tassel as long that it fell below the waist and black sandals with upturned toes, topped by great black silk pompadour. This costume was completed by a very handsome knife two feet long which he carried in his belt.

1000 U. S. Army Horses Are Being Purchased To Mount Castro's Cavalry. One thousand American cavalry horses will be used by Gen. Juan A. EL PASO, Of Division Cited 11 Times For Big Feats In War, Returns

Lieut. Verne Lyman, 25th regular infantry, who took part in the battle of Cantigny May 25, 1918, the first American victory in France, has returned to El Paso, after 18 months' service with the American expeditionary forces. Lieut. Lyman participated in practically every engagement of the American forces in France. The first division, of which his regiment was a part, was cited 11 times for bravery in action and had the honor of winning the first victory of the war. The 16th infantry, formerly stationed at El Paso, in a part of the First Division, participated in the battle of Cantigny, as did also the 18th and 25th Regiments. Lieut. Lyman stated that out of a total of 80 officers in the division, 715 were either wounded or killed on the battlefield.
