Leadville, Colo., April 4.—The Iron-Silver Mining company, operating the Mikado and other properties, has announced a cut in wages of a dollar a day. It is stated that demoralization in metal markets, especially lead and zinc, The Yak mines, owned by the American Smelting and Refining company, have also posted notices of a similar cut and other lead-zinc mines of the district will probably follow suit.

About 1000 men will be affected by the wage reductions announced at this time.

BOLSHEVISM IS UNION MENAGE

British Socialist Leaders Declare It Will Hurt Labor.

London, Eng., April 4.—Great Britain's mass of workers have no sympathy with Bolshevism, the Socialist want every one to know. Bolshevism means anarchy, declare the Socialists, and is a menace to organized trade unionism.

"Merely to denounce Bolshevism and to attempt to deal with it by occasional measures of repression is no cure for the rebellious state of mind into which considerable numbers of the industrial workers of this and other countries appear to have drifted," assert the National Socialist party in a manifesto against the agitators.

Illinois Coal Miners Put Ban On Bolshevism

Peoria, Ill., April 4.—Coal miners of this district of Illinois want no Bolshevism. An attempt to inject it into a recent convention attended by 200 members of the United Mine Workers' union of America by William H. Harrison, president elect of the Peoria-Canton district, resulted in a protest which was interpreted as favoring a nationwide strike as a protest against the non-withdrawal of allied troops from Russia. It was voted down amid an uproar by the introduction of the resolution ruled off the convention floor.

MARICOPA ADOPTS NEW TIME. Phoenix, Ariz., April 4.—The supervisors of Maricopa county, Thursday, decided to shorten their day by one hour, the daylight saving plan and issued an order to advance the county clocks one hour next Monday. It is estimated the entire state now falls into line with the new time.

AMERICAN DAIRY CATTLE WILL DO BIT IN FRANCE. Washington, D. C., April 4.—American dairy cattle are to be sent to devastated districts of France, where they will do their "bit" toward restoring the health of the children of those regions. More than 100 head of pure bred cattle, recently purchased by the French high commission and selected from the best herds by experts of the United States department of agriculture, shortly will leave New York for Havre on a specially equipped transport. There is said to be an urgent demand for milk from the war stricken areas.

SMALLPOX IS REPORTED IN 83 TEXAS COUNTIES. Austin, Tex., April 4.—Smallpox is reported in 83 counties, there being reported at least 100 cases in one county. Some counties in the northwestern part of the state have reported the disease, with one case at Mineral Wells.

Germans Have No Respect For Aged Carlotta

Former Empress of Mexico Mistreated During Belgian Occupation.

Paris, France, April 4.—A dispatch from Brussels, Belgium, to the Paris edition of the New York Herald, says: Full details of the ignominious efforts made by the German and Austrian authorities to disturb the restful old age of princess Carlotta of Belgium, formerly empress Carlotta of Mexico, and also to despoil her of her large fortune, have just been communicated to me on most excellent authority.

It is highly probable that had German or Austrian troops actually entered the chateau, the princess' memory would have been regarded as an awful recollection, for even the roar of artillery, audible during the bombardment of Antwerp, had been enough to throw her into a delirious fever.

Princess Carlotta's household, supported by the highest Belgian legal authorities, fought hard to prevent the requisition of the princess' home by the Germans and at last succeeded. Soon afterwards, however, military delegates from France Joseph, the Austrian emperor, appeared on the scene, backed up by German bayonets, and threatened to commandeer the chateau. The chateau Douchout contained, which might be useful to military ends.

There was another successful legal struggle to deter the invaders from such an outrage. Undeterred, however, by these two failures, the invaders returned once more, this time claiming the whole of princess Carlotta's fortune on the pretext that, owing to her marriage with Maximilian, she had become a member of the Habsburg family and ought consequently to pay her share toward the war expenses of the Austro-Hungarian empire's allies.

King Leopold II's venerable sister has now recovered the calm of old days. She still practices on the piano from time to time or walks without about the grounds of Bouchout castle. But had the Germans conquered she would have become a penniless prisoner at their mercy and in their hands.

FIRE ENTERS CARNIVAL HUT

Wortham Shows Attraction Seems To Enjoy Meal of Flames.

Treating fire with the unconcern of a salamander, Blusy-Blusy, who performs at the Spring Festival being held at Overland and Durango streets for the benefit of the El Paso Rescue home, is either what he says he is, or else an uncommonly good imitator of the real personage.

He is one of the attractions of the Gandy's Wonderland tent of the Wortham shows. "Blusy" stands three feet high in a smoking tent. Not the fire, nor electricity, nor ropes, nor bludgions have any terrors for him.

Blusy extinguishes his cigarette stub by rubbing the burning end across his nose. Lowering a lighted torch down his throat is mere play to him; and he blows blazing fire through his mouth with the serene grin of "Old Nick." He catches melting sealing wax on his tongue as he goes through a ring and chews it like gum.

Blusy seems to have the same immunity to the effects of electricity as from fire. Holding a pair of tongs in his right hand, he burns up a steel file and nails and welds iron with an electrical current, which, so far as the eye can distinguish, passes through his body. When a piece of iron has been heated to the point, he calmly locks the molten mass in two with his tongue and grins at the crowd, while the flames blaze in his mouth. Putting all his performance he keeps up a chatter of witty and comical remarks.
