

"Y" BOXERS SHOW MUCH SKILL IN THEIR PRELIMINARY WORKOUTS

Little Fellows Are Training Consistently at the Association Gymnasium for Carnival to be Held Saturday Night; Nate Cordova Will Meet Hard Man in Young Jodie; The "Black Mask" Is to Appear.

For a 160 pounder, Nate Cordova is about the fastest little fighting machine I have met with hereabouts, stated Tommy Carter, champion lightweight of the U. S. Army, southern division, Tuesday evening after five rounds with Cordova. Nate was pounded up some at the finish, for Carter seemed to imagine that he was dishing out wallops to Bobby Green once or twice during the bout. "I don't know this boy who is going against Cordova next Saturday night at the 'Y' gym," said Carter, "but he must be good to win."

Opponent Is Good. And this is where the argument arises, Young Jodie, Cordova's opponent for Saturday night's mittied at the "Y" gymnasium arena is good. Working out Tuesday night with Hilburn Anderson, Jodie clearly displayed a wallop that carries the K. O. in either hand. Jodie weighed only about 110 pounds, but gave Anderson, who weighs 125 and is a strong, fast boy, all he could handle. In fact, had a decision been given the worst Jodie could have received was a draw. "I believe Nate made a mistake in giving eight or nine pounds," stated a friend of Cordova's after the bout. "There is little doubt that there is no boy in Nate's weight class who can be ready for him, but this thing of giving weight to a lad who can hit like Jodie is dangerous."

Anderson Boxes. Hilburn Anderson, who went three hard rounds before he took on Jodie, proved that he can absorb everything that comes his way and be ready for more. Anderson has a stiff left that he keeps continually in an opponent's face.

George Sendoral, who is to meet Anderson, also took a four-round workout Tuesday night, and did also Harry Pomeroy and Harry Blumenthal. "I hadn't intended to say anything about plots, but as my friend Albert Sigal claims that I have matched some of the best fighters of the boxing club with men hard to beat so that they would be wanted before their meet me, it is time to tell of a few more plots," said Roy Smik, "Y" boxing instructor.

"To begin with, I will admit that I did all I could to match George Sendoral, Nate Cordova and Harry Loman with the best men I could find. We don't want any easy bouts at the gym, but the charge that these boxers will be fixed out is unfounded. They will all have time to rest before their final appearance. In fact, they will be harder to beat than if they had not appeared before that evening.

"Even if they were fixed, it would be no more hazardous, or as much, as I will have in punching the bag before meeting them."

"Now what do you think of this for a plot? I am reliably informed that the members of the boxing class have got together some 40 or 50 routers who are being trained to applaud my work on the bag so that I will respond to the crowd effort and thus spend a second round of steam and be less effective when the big bout comes off. Well, I thank them for the concerted applause—which I might not otherwise get—but I won't come back until I meet them in the ring."


Will Meet "Black Mask." "As for the Black Mask, it will be time enough to find out who he is when we enter the ring. The bout won't go far until that mask will be tossed up enough to let the public see who the big man is unless he kayos me before I can get into a clinch with him. After a clinch, two he won't have any mask unless it is one made of iron which rings of the ring would not permit him to wear."

O'Brien Works Out. "Chicken" O'Brien is a real singer. After making three attempts to get on at the "Y" boxing gym, he has now made one final try. He is now a matter to find a boy of 40 pounds who knows anything about the milt game and one who didn't would hardly make a good match with O'Brien.

START WORK ON ARENA. TOLINO, O., May 14.—Work on the arena for the Willard-Dempsey fight, July 1, probably will be started this week, Tex Rickard, promoter of the fight announced Tuesday.

J. L. McLaughlin, of San Francisco, architect for Rickard, said the arena will be four times as large as the one built by him in Reno for the Jeffries-Johnson fight. The seats will have a maximum height of 24 feet, while the arena itself will be an eight sided affair, 600 feet across. This means that those sitting on the last rows will be 200 feet from the ring, which will be the regulation championship size, 24 feet square.

Rickard has announced that only 150 ringside seats will be reserved for newspapermen. He requested the newspapermen wishing working space for their sport writers make formal application by mail for seats. The advance sale of seats, which will range in price from \$10 to \$50, will open about May 21, Rickard stated.

Jack Dempsey, challenger for the heavyweight title and his manager, Jack Kearns, are expected to arrive here today or Thursday. Willard is expected to arrive by May 25.
