

TELLS COURT OF CAFE HOLDUP

Alleged Accomplice in Robbery Makes Full Statement on Affair.

Bert E. Lenoir, alleged accomplice in the recent Manhattan cafe robbery, made a full statement on the holdup of a waiter and the theft of \$75 from the cash register, which took place about 2 o'clock Tuesday morning.

Officials of the county attorney's office stated they were convinced Lenoir was not implicated in the affair and it is understood he will be released within a short time.

Nick Jackson, the Greek waiter, who was robbed, when asked if he could recognize the alleged highwaymen, Jackson pointed to Russell Couders, who occupied a seat opposite him in Justice Deaver's court, and said: "That is the fellow who robbed me."

Jackson also recalled C. A. Faux, but said that Faux was not with Couders at the time of the hold-up. He testified, however, that Faux, Couders and Lenoir had eaten supper together in the cafe a few hours before the robbery.

Neither Faux nor Couders were placed on the witness stand. The hearing was resumed Friday afternoon.

U. S. Resumes Sugar Price Control; Product Should Sell for 11c Pound.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 22.—The senate agriculture subcommittee, named to consider amendments to the food control act, discussed with attorney general Palmer today a proposed amendment to define "reasonable prices and just profits." Mr. Palmer urged adoption of amendments recommended by him to stop profiteering, but no agreement was reached.

Second Grocer Says He Is To Quit Business

Regardless of Profiteering Talk, Two in El Paso Shut Up Shop.

Either grocers of El Paso are making so much money they don't have to keep at it any more, or, regardless of charges of profiteering, they are making so little, it doesn't pay to keep at it.

The grocers say the latter is the case, and there is an inclination to believe it, since people usually do not give up a business that is making money.

Following the announcement in The Herald yesterday by J. B. Watson that he is retiring from business after 20 years of serving the people of El Paso, A. J. Humphries, proprietor of the Five Points grocery, made the announcement today that he, too, is retiring.

Juarez Officials Say You Can Buy American Foods in Mexico And Bring Them To This Side And Save Money

While El Paso is becoming somewhat excited over the war on profiteers, and while frantic investigations are being made on this side, Juarez consumers quietly smile and continue to purchase their supplies at much less than El Pasoans are able to buy for, although the same source of supply feeds both cities, it is said.

A Juarez official declares that purchasers of meat pay the same wholesale price as El Paso merchants and dealers. They then are forced to pay a customs tax and when they reach Juarez with their meat are required to pay a municipal tax. In spite of the fact that both taxes are added, the Juarez merchants, restaurant proprietors and butchers are said to be able to sell their meat at a profit, for about half what it will bring in El Paso. On chicken the Juarez price is from 50 to 60 percent less, although the principal source of supply is El Paso.

Housewives Swamp Government Food Sale

Boston, Mass., Aug. 22.—Newton housewives crowded into the hall at the opening of the government food sale so that it was necessary for them to drop their packages out of the back window in large quantities. The goods were in such demand that the sale was extended through the night and the help was short. He had to go to the city hall and draft five men to help with the work. An appeal was made for six or seven men who will volunteer their services for the remaining ten days the store will be open. Women are not strong enough for the work.

SALE OF ARMY BLANKETS IS ORDERED HALTED

Washington, D. C., Aug. 22.—War department distributing centers through which surplus army materials are sold were instructed today to discontinue the sale of army blankets. It was explained that the distribution was so wide as had been hoped for and to give all an equal opportunity to purchase the blankets a new distribution system would be worked out.

SCOTTISH RITE MASONS PLAN BIG FALL REUNION IN EL PASO

The fall reunion of the Scottish Rite Masonic bodies will take place at El Paso Nov. 7 to 7, both days inclusive, in a large hall at the city center. It is expected that the railroads will allow special rates for the event. Samuel P. Dallas, district superintendent general of Scottish Rite bodies in Texas, will be present at the reunion and prominent masons are expected from San Antonio and possibly from Galveston.

Urges Wilson Protect U. S. Foreign Trade

Senator Owen fears business reaction due to market curtailment. Washington, D. C., Aug. 22.—President Wilson has been urged in a letter from senator Owen, Oklahoma, ranking Democratic member of the senate banking committee, to take steps to protect the foreign commerce of the United States and bring about an extension of credits to cover European purchases. The letter, as introduced in the senate, also proposed that means be provided to raise upon the validity of European securities offered for sale in the United States.
