

WIFE SUES BRIZ, MAJOR; DIVORCE

Mrs. Beakley Alleges Cruelty, Desertion and Failure to Provide.

Washington, D. C. Sept. 20.—(By George N. Beakley, U. S. army, of Phoenix, Ariz., attached to the judge advocate general's office, was yesterday sued for a limited divorce and alimony by his wife, Mrs. Mary Beakley, who charges cruelty, desertion and failure to provide. They were married October 17, 1914, at Phoenix and have no children.

About two weeks after their marriage they removed to Washington. On August 7 he is alleged to have deserted her. Although he is said to be receiving a salary of \$150 a month, Mrs. Beakley accuses her husband of failure to provide.

ARMY IN NEED OF SIGNAL MEN

El Paso District Alone is Calling For 100 Men to Train.

A call has gone out to young men with knowledge of telegraphy, photography and telephone work to join the signal corps. In case men have no knowledge of these things, the appeal sent out Saturday by the war department says opportunity will be given to learn them.

According to Lieut. Col. Clyde V. Simpson, district signal officer, no branch of the army has been so greatly depleted by discharges as the signal corps. High salaries are offered to signal men in private life, not only in this country, but in others. The El Paso district alone needs more than 100 men in this service. Col. Simpson says:

Courses of instruction will be given in radio work, telephone repair work, cable splicing, storage battery work, driving cars, meteorological observation, photographic and motion picture work.

1250 AMERICAN SOLDIERS LEAVE SIBERIA FOR HOME

Vladivostok, Siberia, Sept. 20.—(By the Associated Press.)—The transport of 1250 American troops, principally members of the 27th infantry, left for the United States September 17 by way of Manila, and should arrive in San Francisco about October 27. Replacement troops arrived here September 8.

EIGHTH CAVALRYMEN BEGIN TO ARRIVE AT FORT BLISS

Fort Bliss was taken over Saturday by the advance units of the Eighth cavalry which reached here Friday from the northern sector of the Big Bend district. The detachment that arrived consisted of Troop B, 66 men and one officer. Another troop of the eighth will arrive the first of the week, after which the remainder will shortly follow.

TWO PRECINCTS ADDED TO CITY

Tax Collector Estimates 12,000 Poll Taxes Will Be Issued.

Two additional voting precincts have been created in the city of El Paso, increasing the total number to 41. E. W. Haight, chief clerk to tax collector R. Del Richey, announced Saturday. In creating the new precincts several of the old precincts have been divided and new boundaries created. Hill street is the new boundary line between precincts five and six. Willow street between precincts eight and nine; Montana street between precincts 22 and 23; Rudolph and Fossil streets between precincts 28 and 29, and Park street between precincts 40 and 41. The outside boundary of precincts 40 and 41 will be the city limits. Austin Terrace will be included in precinct 14. Poll tax payments will be received after October 1. Tax collector R. Del Richey estimates that approximately 12,000 poll receipts will be paid this year. Poll taxes last year numbered 10,870.

Rumanians Strip Hungary As They Leave Budapest

Budapest, Hungary, Sept. 20.—(By the Associated Press.)—The situation here is growing more critical. As the Rumanians withdraw they continue to requisition railway equipment of all kinds, virtually stripping the country of the means of railway transport. It is stated in Hungarian quarters that the food in Budapest is insufficient to care for the needs of the people.

The Rumanians are taking with them, it is charged, almost everything movable on which they can lay hands, including livestock, fodder and agricultural implements.

The Rumanians now demand that the Hungarians redeem at present value 250,000,000 "white" kronen, or Bolshevik money, for an equal amount of "blue money" of the present government. If this is done, it is stated, Hungary will be wholly unable to pay for food and other necessities.

RUMANIA CALLS VOLUNTEERS; EXPECTS BOLSHEVIK TROUBLE

Geneva, Switzerland, Sept. 20.—Rumania is calling volunteer troops scattered through southern Russia for the frontier river in anticipation of Bolshevik disorders, according to a statement today by the Rumanian bureau at Bern. It is said Rumania also is expediting repatriation of 50,000 Rumanian troops from Transylvania.

GERMANY'S CHILD DEFICIT SINCE 1914 IS 2,500,000

Berlin, Germany, Sept. 20.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—Prof. Emil Abderhalden, noted physiologist, says Germany's deficit in children since 1914 is 2,500,000 and child mortality has continued to increase.

SEE BIG CHANGE IN CHIHUAHUA

Officials of Mexico North-western Return From Inspection of Lines.

Officials of the Mexico North Western railroad, who have just returned from a two weeks' inspection tour of the lines, report conditions excellent along the entire line. They say the crop outlook is splendid and that the mines at Cuaj are working steadily.

The state is quiet, officers state, and fewer bandits are operating than at any time recently. Government officials are functioning regularly, they say, and both federal troops and the home guards are continually on the alert to give battle to the bandits whenever they may be found.

The Mexicans expect the trip a pleasant one. The opinion is expressed that with conditions rapidly improving and the short time the state will be absolutely free of bandits and at peace again.

Big \$200,000 Fire In Chihuahua City; A Storekeeper Held

Chihuahua, Mex., Sept. 20.—The big two store buildings on the corner of Ocampo and Victoria streets, property of Don Carlos Zuloaga, valued at 170 thousand pesos, Mexican gold, were destroyed by fire that was impossible to control, as there is no fire department in that city.

The fire started in a grocery store in the first floor of the building owned by Francisco de la Haza and in three hours the building was a heap of ashes. A dozen small shops on the first floor were destroyed and on the second floor, where many families were living, the damage reached more than 20,000 pesos.

The building was insured for 75,000 pesos and the grocery store for 20,000 pesos. The storekeeper, a clerk, and a woman in charge of the store, pending an investigation of the cause of the fire. About a year ago a store owned by Muela was destroyed by a fire of unknown origin.

Without any disturbance was celebrated the "Fiestas Patrias" here. No foreigners were molested in any form and thousands of people thronged the streets and plazas by the 15th and 16th. Some thousands of dollars worth of fireworks were burned last night in the great squares in El Paso park, making a magnificent spectacle.

Chihuahua, Mex., Sept. 20.—The mayors (presidents) municipales of Aldama and Jimenez, charged with irregularities, are now under investigation by order of Gov. Ortiz.

PRESIDENT CARRANZA TO VISIT NORTHERN MEXICO

Mexico City, Mex., Sept. 20.—(By the Associated Press.)—President Carranza is departing for a trip of several weeks duration to the northern part of the republic. Arrangements have been completed for a large party to accompany him, including several members of the cabinet and a strong military escort.

The foreign relations department has announced that the Mexican consul at Denver, Colorado, is instructed to obtain all facts as to the circumstances surrounding the hanging recently of two Mexicans at Pueblo, Colorado.

MEXICO SEEKS TO COMPEL FORFEITURE OF OIL LANDS

Washington, D. C., Sept. 20.—Further testimony intended to show Mexico's determination to force the cession of oil lands owned by foreigners was given today by Ira J. W. Williams, an officer of the Panosco Trust in connection with the state committee investigating the Mexican situation.

Williams declared that American companies who remained in Mexico had realized the necessity of maintaining uninterrupted flow of the oil for the allied nations.

"Even of these men," he said, "have paid the supreme sacrifice."

Alamogordo-El Paso Highway Stays; New Mexico Is Not To Abandon It

THE state of New Mexico has not abandoned its state highway the road between Alamogordo and El Paso and never will. These projects have the pledged backing of the New Mexico highway commission and will be built.

"El Paso should cease its efforts to run cars over the cutoff from here to Deming. Such a road can never be kept up except at great cost and the state of New Mexico and the counties affected will never pay up this money."

Says Show Good Faith. "El Paso county has a good concrete road north to Anthony, and Dona Ana county is now building a concrete highway north from there. Dona Ana and Luna counties will also keep repaired the road between Mesilla and Deming. It will be possible for cars to make the trip quicker and safer from El Paso to Deming by way of Mesilla than by this so-called El Paso-Deming cutoff and El Paso should withdraw its support for that sandy cutoff and show the New Mexico highway commission and the New Mexico people that it is willing to cooperate with them; that when they send cars in here from Alamogordo, El Pasoans are willing to send them out by the way of Mesilla Park, as New Mexico wishes.
