

PLANS FLIGHT TO SOUTH POLE

British Explorer Expects To Make Last 750 Miles By Plane.

London, Eng., Sept. 26.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.) John G. Cope, leader of the expedition to the South pole to start next June, says his airplane flight to the pole will be about 750 miles. The base from which the airplane will start is about 100 miles from the pole. The airplane will be heavily loaded.

ARMENIAN WOMEN CONSTRUCT 100 MILES OF STONE ROAD

Marzash, Armenia, Sept. 26.—Five hundred Armenian women employed by the American Red Cross have built 100 miles of stone roads and reconstructed several stone bridges in this section within the last four months. The roads were rebuilt in order to facilitate transportation of Red Cross supplies.

TEXAS MAN ASKS COMPENSATION FOR INJURY TO ARTIFICIAL LIMB

He alleged that he was thrown from a wagon by a runaway team while making deliveries, and that his artificial leg was damaged, asking compensation for the time he lost while the leg was being repaired. His claim was denied.

BUFFALO HASN'T GONE FOR GOOD

He Is Coming Back—Crossed With Cattle, He's a Great Animal.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 26.—There are now no less than seven thousand buffaloes in North America. They are increasing rapidly, and America's most famous and characteristic large animal is considered to be fairly safe from extermination. The buffalo has long figured in the popular mind as a creature practically or nearly extinct. But for the last twenty years, while Indians have been ruthlessly exterminated, by attending strictly to the business of raising calves, and paying no attention to the alarming rumors that he was extinct, the buffalo, as a species, has literally crawled out of his grave.

As showing how important publicity has been to the buffalo, the scientists compare him with the pronghorn antelope. There are now only about 3000 of these animals in the United States, and they are in far greater danger of extermination than the buffalo. Although slightly more numerous, they are not nearly so well protected and do not live and breed well in captivity. These reservations are set aside for them, and other radical measures taken for their protection, they will be gone in another few years.

And the antelope is just as distinctive and interesting an American animal as the buffalo. Like the buffalo it once lived all over half the continent in uncounted millions. Buffalo Domesticate. The buffalo, in addition to his held upon popular affection, has another strong claim to the right of survival. In the fact that he has great possibilities as a domestic animal.

It has been usual to say that the buffalo had to give way to the cattle herds on the western plains and it is probably true that it would have been impossible to conserve the enormous wild herds of buffalo to use them for the national meat supply instead of domestic cattle. But now that the buffalo has been reduced in numbers and handled like a domestic animal in many parks, it has been discovered that he is really not much harder to manage than any other variety of cattle. It is true that he retains a contempt for fences, and the great weight of his shoulders, protected by a mantle of heavy coat, enables him to express this contempt for barb wire by going right through it. An ordinary three or four strand barbed wire fence does not hold him at all.

But government buffalo pastures are enclosed in woven wire fencing with strong posts planted about sixteen feet apart. This spacing gives the fence a certain resilience, so that when the buffalo hits it, he has a tendency to bounce back. Can Stand the Cold. The potential value of the buffalo as a domestic animal lies in the fact that he can stand very cold weather. He can survive a winter that would kill cattle, and can get to the grass through deeper snow than can cattle.

The cattle, which is a cross between the buffalo and domestic stock, is an even more resistant animal than the buffalo. This hybrid is generally larger than either of its parents. It inherits the hardiness of the buffalo and also his heavy valued coat. A cattle robe has been sold for \$1200. Of the seven thousand buffalo now alive, about half are in the United States and half in Canada. The government owns slightly less than a thousand buffalo. These are on eight reservations and national parks, the largest herd being that of the Yellowstone, with 410 members.

DELINQUENT OCCUPATION TAXES COLLECTED IN TEXAS Austin, Texas, Sept. 26.—The state controller, J. B. Terrell, has reported a total of \$149,554.50 in delinquent occupation and gross receipts taxes since the taking over of the revenue department this year. He continued: "This amount was delinquent from one to 15 years. We also added more than 400 new accounts in the records of this office, and in the future they will make regular reports and remittances to the state."

REBEL LEADERS TAKING NO CHANCES WITH DESERTERS Mexico City, Mexico, Sept. 26.—Since the coup that resulted in Zapata's death, rebel leaders are not taking chances with deserters from the government ranks. If a story published by Excelsior is well founded, some time ago the paper says, about 500 members of the 24th infantry, stationed at Epazaco, Vera Cruz, joined the forces of Gen. Zapata, operating in the state of Puebla. Zapata has placed his recruits in the front line whenever there was necessity for fighting. Federal forces have been making an active campaign against Zapata and, of the 500 deserters, there are now about 150 left.

KING OF ENGLAND TO GIVE MEDALS TO COLONIAL MARINES London, Eng., Sept. 26.—The king has directed that the British war medals, heretofore granted only to men of the kingdom's armed land and naval forces, also be awarded certain men of the British dominions, colonial and Indian mercantile marine. The medals, in silver, will be given men of the classes, who served at sea for not less than six months in the war period. A bronze mercantile marine war medal, in addition, will be given men of the classes named, who served at sea on at least one voyage through a danger zone.

RUMANIAN STATEMENT SHOWS LITTLE COMEDY OF THE WAR London, Eng., Sept. 26.—A little comedy of the war is revealed in an official Rumanian statement just received in London. When Austria-Hungary collapsed, and the various races set about solving themselves into separate nations, the little island of Orsova, at the junction of three states—Austria-Hungary, Serbia and Rumania, was forgotten. After many months the Orsovanians have just decided to place their faith in Rumania.
