Generals At Head Of Military Departments Authorized To Furnish Troops Necessary To Protect Lives and Property In Their Departments When Asked By State Officials Without Referring Requests.

JERSEY POSSE SURROUNDS A NEGRO WHO ATTACKED WOMAN

Mercersville, N. J., Sept. 29.—(Special to the Herald.)—A posse of more than 100 armed men searched throughout the night, it is expected momentarily, headed by sheriff Lippincott, of Burlington county, the posse early last night surrounded a swamp where the negro was believed to have fled, but at an early hour today the fugitive had not been apprehended. Threats of violence have been made should the negro be captured, but the authorities declared they were able to protect him.

Soldiers Disarm Crowd Of Negroes In Omaha; Mayor Still Improving; Additional Troops Arrive In City

OMAHA, Neb., Sept. 29.—The condition of mayor Ed. P. Smith, who was injured here Sunday during race rioting, when a mob attempted to lynch him, was improving this morning. The mayor is still at the hospital to which he was taken following the attempted lynching.

Military forces which have been on duty patrolling the streets of the city were augmented today by the arrival of 11 men and 13 officers from Camp Grant, Ill. About 300 more soldiers arrived later in the day from Camp Funston, Kans.

The city was quiet last night. No disorders of any kind occurred. Regular army soldiers and special police patrolled the city throughout the night. Twenty-four negroes, dressed in civilian clothes, wearing special police badges and carrying arms, appeared at Twenty-fourth and Carnegie streets last night. They said they had been sworn in as special officers by a city official. Soldiers took their weapons away and released them.

U. S. STAYS DRY MOST SERIOUS SITUATION SINCE UNTIL TREATY IS RATIFIED

Attorney General Gives Ruling, Though Demobilization Is Ended. CAN'T LIFT WAR TIME BAN NOW

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 29.—(Special to the Herald.)—The attorney general has given a ruling that the prohibition law remains in effect until the peace treaty is ratified. The attorney general stated that the prohibition law cannot be lifted until after the ratification of the peace treaty, in the opinion of attorney general Palmer.

The prohibition law provides that it shall remain in force until after the termination of the war and the demobilization of the army. Mr. Palmer has held that the state of war does not end until the peace treaty has been ratified.

President Wilson took a similar position in asking congress early in the war to repeal the war time prohibition law insofar as it affected light wines and beer.

Return officers to old rank. The war department statement as to the end of the demobilization was made in connection with an announcement that officers of the regular army were about to be returned to their normal peace time rank and that the 10,000 emergency officers would be discharged in order to reduce the commissioned personnel to the 15,000 authorized by a recent act of congress.

GERMANY REPORTED BOTTLED UP AGAIN BY BLOCKADE OF ALLES

Beginning Today, Says Paris Paper, No Food Ships Will Be Allowed To Start For Germany, Due To Failure To Withdraw Von Der Goitz's Teuton Troops From Baltic Region; Von Der Goitz Recalled?

PARIS, France, Sept. 29.—The blockade of Germany, which was threatened by the allies in case the German troops of Gen. von Der Goitz were not removed from the Baltic region, will begin today, according to the dispatches. No food ships, it declares, will be permitted to start for Germany until further orders are issued.

Hohenzollern's Arms Eliminated From New German Esculcheon

BERLIN, Germany, Sept. 29.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—Germany has a new escutcheon from which the Hohenzollern arms have been eliminated. It consists of a black eagle on a golden yellow field.

SENATE ASKS WILSON REPORT ON SAILORS LANDING IN ALMATY

Peace Conference Views Italian Elections As Struggle Between War and Peace Parties; All Balkans May Be Involved in Turmoil; U. S. Marines Patrol Spalato; Feeling High; Italians Request Trau Landing.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 29.—(Special to the Herald.)—After further sharp criticism by Republicans of the senate and house today of the landing of American sailors at Trau after Italian forces had taken possession of the port, the senate adopted a resolution by senator New, Republican, Indiana, requesting president Wilson to transmit a report of the incident to the senate.

The resolution caused a lively row, in which senator Hitchcock, Democrat, charged the Republicans with "backbiting" president Wilson and also with deliberately filibustering to delay action on the peace treaty.

Senator Lodge denied there was any filibustering and said there would be none.

"There is no objection to the resolution," said Mr. Hitchcock, "but it is rather disgraceful in the senate to be forever prodding and annoying the administration while it is doing the best it can under serious circumstances."

Senator Hitchcock reiterated that the American troops were landed under orders of the supreme council at Paris to prevent "any further break in the relations between the Jugoslavs and Italians."

Hitchcock to name the American member of war council, and Hitchcock's reply that he would not attempt to do so brought a laughter from Republican senators.

President Recovers Sufficiently To Show Interest In Pact and Receive Favorable Report From Backers, But Must Continue Out Of Fight For Present; Fall Amendments May Not Come Up This Week.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 29.—(Special to the Herald.)—President Wilson, after two days of quiet and rest at the white house, showed further improvement today. Rear admiral Cary T. Grayson, his personal physician, issued the following bulletin at 11 a. m.:

"The president had a good night's rest and is improving."

President Wilson arose early this morning and appeared refreshed by a night of rest, secretary Tammaly announced.

Although the president's condition precludes his taking any active part in directing the peace treaty fight in the senate, he has shown much interest and received a report on the situation from secretary Tammaly last night.

Senators directing the administration fight for ratification of the treaty without amendment or reservation advised the president through Mr. Tammaly that the treaty would not be amended and that no reservations which would require its resubmission would be adopted.

Another day of complete rest was prescribed for president Wilson today. Yesterday's prohibition against work or worry which enabled his physician, Dr. Cary T. Grayson, to announce last night that Mr. Wilson was "slightly better" was understood to have convinced white house officials that this course of treatment would be the most effective cure for his attack of nervous exhaustion.

Senate leaders today refused to predict when the Fall amendments to the German peace treaty would be brought to a final vote.

Yesterday's prolonged debate was considered in some quarters as indicating that the Fall amendments which would relieve the United States of representation on most of the committee would not be brought up for final action this week.

Senator Borah's reference to the race riots and other trouble provoked a sharp reply by senator Williams, who declared race was greater than any other matter and stood above all law, human or divine.

When the treaty was called up, senator Borah in a spirited address pleaded for a return to the old American ideal, first painting a red picture of the treaty as attempted by archivist hands and declaring that with lawlessness rampant here and elsewhere in Europe it was no time for the United States to face the old principles and link up with every nation in Europe which had extended would not assure the peace of the world.

Senator Borah's reference to the race riots and other trouble provoked a sharp reply by senator Williams, who declared race was greater than any other matter and stood above all law, human or divine.

At the order of Dr. Grayson not only have all engagements for the near future been canceled, but it has been decided that for the present the president will not be permitted to see any of the senate leaders regarding the treaty controversy.
