War Relic Contest For The Children Herald To Award Cash Prizes Dec. 5

HERE is a chance for some school children in El Paso to win a cash prize in the big free war exhibit essay contest to be conducted by The El Paso Herald. With the Wortham shows, which opened in El Paso this afternoon to be the big feature of the Fall Festival, under the auspices of the Rescue Home, is the biggest private owned exhibit of war relics in this country. This exhibit is free.

In it are some three thousand trophies, every one with a story connected.

To the child who writes the best essay of three hundred words on the free war exhibit as a whole, or any part of it, The El Paso Herald will award the first prize of \$10. Those writing the second best and the third best essays will be awarded prizes of \$5 each.

All the contestants have to do is to visit the free war exhibit on the grounds at West Overland and Durango streets, write the essay and send it to The El Paso Herald addressed to "The Free War Exhibit Editor."

The contest starts with the opening of the big carnival today. With the war exhibit is a staff of soldiers,

all of whom have been in the trenches and have sniffed gun powder. They lecture constantly on the big display making special talks on the larger and more interesting relics shown.

Among them is a member of the famous "Princess Pat" regiment of Canada. His command went into action with a full regimental quota and when he answered his last roll call before his discharge, only thirteen other men of the original regiment were in line. He was crippled but able to take his place among his comrades.

The free war exhibit contest has been fully explained to A. H. Hughey, superintendent of El Paso schools. He sees in The Herald's contest a big opportunity for the children of El Paso to improve themselves in composition. He cheerfully recommends that the children enter the contest, and that teachers encourage the children in this work.

The essay contest was conducted at Fort Worth by the Fort Worth Record. Supt. of schools R. M. Moore, of that city, declared the war exhibit was a thing of great historical value, and its choice as a subject for essays gave the school children wonderful opportunity to enter into a contest.

RATE INCREASE SPLITS W. O. W.

Secession Threatened by Insurgents Unless Insurance Costs Lowered.

St. Louis, Mo., Nov. 23.—Delegates of the Woodmen of the World from 15 states met Monday and formed an organization to fight the increase insurance rates adopted last July from becoming effective.

It was voted to raise \$100,000 to carry on the campaign and finance the suit pending at Nebraska City, Neb., to restrain officials of the secession camp from enforcing the new rate schedule effective January 1, next.

The new organization is to be known as the Protective League of Woodmen of the World and Woodmen organization would consider seceding from the parent body unless the new rates were lowered.

It was alleged the new schedule, in effect, is an increase from 100 to 100 percent over the present one.

States represented at the meeting included Texas and New Mexico.
