Inside the Republican party are the conservatives, like Harding, Lodge, Mann, Fordney, Longworth and others who like the iron hand type of government in dealing with "socialists" and "radical" movements. But there are also men like Cummings, Borah, Capper, Norris and others, who will not permit the passage of legislation that enables the department of justice or any other department of the government to have discretionary powers to raid anybody's dwelling on suspicion and arrest and threaten persons whose views or opinions may happen to be distasteful.

The raid of last Saturday excited suspicion in some parts of Washington but doubt in others. MEXICAN CATTLE EXPORTS DROP

Raids of Outlaws Cut Supply of Livestock in Chihuahua.

Imports from Mexico through El Paso have become negligible. In former years this city was one of the most important points of entry from Mexico for livestock. Today the amount of cattle passing through this city is nil.

This statement was made by Thomas A. Brady, inspector in charge of the bureau of animal industry for the districts of El Paso and Arizona. This change, he declared, is due to unsettled conditions in Chihuahua, the region of outlaw raids imperiling the supply of stock in that vicinity.

During December the inspector's report shows that while a total of 7,000 animals came in at Nogales, but 237 were entered at El Paso. The inspectors were composed entirely of cattle of various grades, with the exception of 20 horses and mules which were entered at El Paso and but 100 at Nogales. The total number of animals brought in at El Paso were 274 four-year-old steers and 21 cows, while through the Arizona gateway there were 1,000 head of cattle, 273 two-year-olds, 237 three-year-olds, and 1,002 four-year-old steers, also 273 horses, 112 mules, 9 calves and 74 cows.

Of all the December imports, 6588 went to California for grazing. The rest to Arizona for grazing and 100 for slaughter. 11TH DISTRICT GOVT. CLUBS TO BE FORMED

Object Is To Promote More Friendship In Army Life.

The formation of company clubs by every company in the United States army is authorized in an order recently issued by Maj. Gen. W. G. Hearn, director of the war plans division of the war department. Bulletin No. 1, which outlines the purposes of these clubs and the methods to be followed in organizing them was received Monday by Chaplain Walter H. Zimmerman, director of army welfare work in this district.

The plan to organize company clubs, the bulletin explains, is the result of considerable study of the numerous mailboxes and the conclusion that club life will more nearly fill the social, moral and recreational needs of the American soldier than anything else that could be devised.

Under the order, which is to be carried out at Fort Bliss at once, a conference of chaplains, company commanders and educational and recreational directors, postal officers and representatives in charge of service clubs is to be called to plan for organizing these clubs. The organization men, regardless of grade or rank, are to be allowed their say in the formation and management of the clubs.
