

CHICAGO 'FLU' MOUNTS AGAIN

Chicago, Ill., Feb. 3.—Influenza and pneumonia, which yesterday appeared to be on the wane, took a sharp upward spurt today, and at the same time deaths from the two diseases reached 135, only six less than the heaviest day's toll at the height of the epidemic.

ECONOMIC CRISIS FACING COUNTRY

Increased production everywhere in the city is vital in the farm situation.

"Instead of waiting for shorter hours and more pay, it would have been better to have worked harder for the present high scale of wages."

In the same connection, Judge O. G. Smith, of Nebraska, of the National Farmers' congress, told his colleagues at the gathering here that actual production of winter wheat today showed only 57 percent and a falling off of 10 percent in production.

The average net income of 224 farms in the richest portions of Iowa, where the price of wheat is highest, was \$2480. If 5 percent be allowed for interest on the investment in the land and for the risk to the business, there is left an average of only \$1234 to pay for the cost of the land and the farmer's labor.

"The fact is that the price of food rose and the price of wheat fell. Profits of food production have moved up in approximately the same proportion as the price of wheat and in response to the same worldwide cause, war and scarcity and current inflation.

"Well, what is the answer? What are we going to do about it?" was the question asked Mr. Atkinson. "There is not anything to be done," he said. "Things must take their natural course. People in the cities will not be convinced any other way. They will have to wait until the price of food falls and there will be more labor to produce food."

FOUR MEN SENT TO PRISON BY FEDERAL DISTRICT COURT

Judge W. R. Smith of the federal district court Monday afternoon sentenced Tony Bernal to two years in the penitentiary and Jim Murphy, Fred Caldwell and Frank Johnson to a year and a day in the penitentiary.

Francisco Rojas and Daniel Carlet, pleading guilty to the same offense, were sentenced to a year and a day in the penitentiary. They also were given a pad of blank money orders from a postoffice at Bartlett, Iowa, and filled them out.

John Gilmore was given the severest sentence in prison. He was found guilty of violating the Harrison anti-narcotic law and was sentenced to three years in prison. He was convicted on evidence furnished by Henry Araki, a Japanese, who turned state's evidence against him.

LEASING BILL WILL OPEN 75,000,000 ACRES IN WEST

Washington, D. C., Feb. 3.—The conference report on the oil land leasing bill was ready to be submitted today to the house, where an effort will be made to give its immediate passage.

As now proposed the bill affects oil, coal, gas, phosphate, sodium and oil shale lands and is strictly a leasing measure, all provisions for outright sale of lands are eliminated.

Under the measure approximately 75,000,000 acres of government coal lands would be opened for development as well as about 8,000,000 acres of oil lands.

"The bill specifies only a minimum royalty upon 75 per cent of the royalty received on past production going to the reclamation fund, 25 per cent to the states in which the oil was produced, and 10 per cent to the government. All royalties derived from oil, gas, coal, phosphate and sodium produced in the future will be distributed, 25 per cent to the reclamation fund, 25 per cent to the states and 10 per cent to the government."

DROUTH STRICKEN COUNTIES ARE REPAYING STATE MONEY

Austin, Tex., Feb. 3.—General prosperity which has prevailed during 1919 in west Texas is causing many of the counties situated in the so-called drouth stricken district to repay the money borrowed from the state. Upward of \$50,000 has so far been repaid. Quite a number of the counties are paying only a portion of the money.

As these funds were subscribed by voluntary subscription throughout the state, it has not been fully determined what to do with this money, but for the present it is being deposited in the state treasury.

JANUARY WARMER THAN AVERAGE IN EL PASO

Warmer weather than usual was experienced in El Paso during January, according to R. H. Shaver, observer at the weather bureau. Highest temperature was 64 on the 20th; the lowest 20, on the 31st. Normal for this month is 46.1. The average daily excess was 3. Snowfall measured 2.9 inches, and the precipitation 2.9. There were 13 clear days, 6 partly cloudy and 13 cloudy. There was more than .91 inch precipitation on eight days.
