

ROBBERS LOOT DEPOSIT BOXES

Fountain, Colo., Feb. 15.—Robbers last night broke into the bank here and rifled 25 or more safety deposit boxes. An attempt to get into the main vault where more than \$100,000 in cash was on deposit failed as the locks could not be broken, although the doors were broken. A desperate attempt was made to break them down. The amount of the loot from the private boxes has not been checked out. The robbery was discovered at 7 o'clock this morning. A hole two feet in diameter was found to have been dug through the solid brick wall surrounding the deposit boxes. Heavy pieces of iron from nearby railroad tracks were used in hammering rings to gain access to the inner chamber of the safe. No definite clues have been established as to the identity of the robbers, it is said.

Committee To Probe Charges Against Fowler

Dr. R. L. Rumer, president of the school board, has appointed Charles H. Stevens, H. M. Andrews and John O. Lowman to investigate the charges brought against R. W. Fowler, principal of the high school, who ordered ejected from the high school building last week by the school board. A controversy between Fowler and the board has been going on since the Fowler was appointed secretary of the Y. M. C. A. over the latter's son.

The committee is expected to have its report completed when the board meets next Tuesday night.

Roads Like Plan Of Consolidated Ticket Offices

Washington, D. C., Feb. 15.—Consolidated ticket offices established during federal operation of the railroads will be retained in most large cities when the roads are returned to private control, according to information received at the railroad administration.

Most of the companies were said to have "indented" the public convenience and economies afforded by grouping the sales forces instead of having them scattered. Chicago, it is said, may abandon the plan because one of the biggest roads there has insisted on having a place exclusively for its own business.

WORK FOR BOYS IS TO BE PUSHED

Measuring boys by the yard stick method in their physical, intellectual, vocational and service attainments and comparing them to standards set for American boys is the latest innovation in the Y. M. C. A. program for boys throughout the country, according to H. J. Howard.

This program known as the Christian citizenship training program for boys, was just introduced in the south west by the interstate committee of the Y. M. C. A. with headquarters in El Paso and branch offices in Albuquerque and Phoenix. "Plenty of outdoor work and physical training, including swimming and nature study, are included in this program, which promises to bring about a closer companionship and a better understanding between the average boy and his parents, as well as to accomplish other distinct benefits for the social average boy himself," said Mr. Diamond. "The entire aim of the enterprise is to help American boys build health, confidence, courage, clear thinking, a definite ambition and a thorough and well-balanced fitness for success in business or professional life, and also in community, national and world citizenship."
