SHIPS SALES BAR PROLONGED BY NAVY'S DELAY

Failure To Act On Recommendations Cost Hundreds Of Lives. ADMIRAL DENIES ANY MUD SLINGING Assails Statement He Is Pro-British Or Pro-Allyed.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 8.—The admiral's delay today told the senate committee investigating the navy's conduct of the war that the failure of the navy department to act promptly on recommendations and to place the country's entire naval resources at the disposal of the allies within six months after the United States entered the war prolonged the struggle for at least four months. He added that it also unnecessarily jeopardized the outcome.

J. W. WILSON CHANGE HIS POSITION

Friends Threaten To Desert Him If Slander Of Wilson Continues. CAMPAIGN OPENS NEXT THURSDAY Ex-Senator Expected To Endorse Specific Acts Of Administration.

DALLAS, Texas, March 8.—Ex-senator Joe Bailey is considering modification of his position relative to the Wilson administration, according to reports received in Dallas today. He left Washington Monday night for Dallas. It has been said that Bailey's headquarters in Dallas will give specific endorsement to the achievements of the party within the last seven days. Bailey's friends have told him that he cannot put over on Texas people the "red herring" of his position as an absolute failure. They have gone so far as to say that if Bailey continues to slander Wilson and his administration as he has in the past, senator Bailey's position will not be supported in the political activities during the campaign.

REPUBLICAN LEADERS AGREE TO MODIFYING TREATY RESERVATION

President Wilson's Letter to Senator Hitchcock Outlining Position, Throws New Light On Ratification Fight, Where Debate Has Been Limited in Effort to Hurry Decision; Pleads for Life of Article 10.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 9.—A modified draft of the Republican article 10 reservation to the peace treaty is understood to have been agreed to today by a number of Republican leaders working with the Democrats for a ratification compromise. The new reservation was said to follow in general the outline of the original Republican proposal adopted last November, but it contains a number of changes in wording agreed to at the suggestion of Democrats. Republican leaders expressed confidence that the new reservation would have the approval of senator Lodge, Massachusetts, Republican leader, that the Democratic leader, senator Hitchcock, of Nebraska, had not assented to it. Democratic senators were also in agreement to accept the new reservation, which was said to be the result of a long and arduous struggle. President Wilson's letter to senator Hitchcock outlining his stand on reservations to the peace treaty was given today to the ratification fight in the senate, where debate has been limited by unanimous consent in an effort to hurry a decision. Although the president did not say what reservations he would accept or reject, he declared that almost all the qualifications suggested were "in effect virtual nullifications" of the pact.
