

PICK 12 JURORS AT TOMBSTONE

Tombstone, Ariz., March 10.—The jury of 12 men which is to try Henry E. Woodson, hardware dealer of El Paso, on a charge of kidnaping in connection with the deportation of 1186 striking copper miners and their sympathizers from Bisbee to Columbus, N. M., was announced here today when J. E. James, clerk of the superior court, read the names of those members of the tentative jury of 25 who remained after the state had exercised its five and the defense its seven peremptory challenges.

HUNDREDS DIE IN EARTHQUAKE

Tiflis, Russia, Feb. 24.—(Via Constantinople), March 10.—(By the Associated Press).—Several hundred persons are dead and thousands of others are homeless as a result of an earthquake today which destroyed Makhth, Grakall and other villages within a radius of 60 miles west of Tiflis. The city of Tiflis was shaken and many buildings were severely damaged.

Thousands of refugees are pouring into Tiflis. The railway between Tiflis and Batoum was severely damaged by the earth shock while the station was destroyed at Gori, a short distance northwest of Tiflis. The town of Gori was virtually wiped out and a hundred dead have already been recovered from the wreckage.

Lane Asks Big Water Reserve For Southwest

Los Angeles, Calif., March 10.—Discussing a plan upon which he is working for impounding waters of the Colorado river and irrigating 1,200,000 acres of southwestern land, Franklin K. Lane, former secretary of the interior, in an address here yesterday, said:

"Can you offer any good reason why we can't break down the walls of the Grand Canyon, 100 miles this side of El Tovar, creating a gigantic water reservoir? Such a project would create the greatest dam of its kind in the world."

A statement was issued Wednesday by the board of pardons, which is now in El Paso, requesting those who are friends or acquaintances of the penitentiary deserving of consideration or leniency, appear before the board, which is in session in room 411 of the McCoy hotel.

Some Have Good Records. About three-fourths of the men in the penitentiary at El Paso county are Mexicans and only a few of them have friends who are seeking their pardon. Some of the men have splendid records and, according to the board, would be good citizens if released if the board was told of their cases.
